

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT: MARCH 2022

The council was informed that a former councillor, Douglas Angwin, had passed away. Cllr Brown, who served on the council alongside Cllr Angwin, writes, "Douglas was an excellent councillor who brought



dignity, wisdom and considerable knowledge to the role. A self-effacing man, he gave great support to me when I was Chairman, particularly at Community Network meetings. I shall miss his dry sense of humour, too."

The Planning Committee met on 9 March when six applications were considered. The minutes of planning committee meetings can be seen on the parish council's website.

A public consultation meeting was held on 16 March to discuss the proposal to introduce a 20mph speed limit in most of the parish. One or two matters need to be sorted out but, generally, the proposals received considerable support.

The parish council met on 30 March. In the public participation session, support was expressed for the proposed new emergency planning measures that the council would be discussing later in the meeting. Also mentioned was the maintenance of a triangle of land in West Park, which it was agreed would be the responsibility of the parish council, and the clearance of the bus shelter in the centre of the village (more on that below). It was also reported that traffic-recording strips had been placed strategically around the parish which would provide useful information on the speed and volume of traffic both before and after the implementation of the new 20mph scheme.

Cllr Williams, our ward councillor, reported a slight delay in the installation of the average speed cameras on the A39, as well as a slight delay on the construction of the virtual footway over the bridge in the centre of the village, but both schemes should be completed during the summer. Discussions were continuing over the appropriate speed limit on Cove Hill and the possible introduction of yellow lines.

It was agreed that CIIr Davey would look into the possibility of arranging a tea party to celebrate the Queen's platinum jubilee.

The council decided that the bus stop and information centre opposite the pub should be cleared of all the books that are currently stored there so that it can resume its original function as a bus shelter and information centre. Members of the WI, four of whom attended the council meeting and who had cleaned the shelter from time to time, supported this course of action. Councillors thanked the WI ladies for their work in trying to maintain the shelter in a decent condition, but everybody was agreed that the time had come to terminate the shelter's role as a book-swap store. Relatively few books were being exchanged and recently the shelter had been used more as a book dump, rather than a bookstore. Unfortunately, books had rapidly deteriorated in an environment that was exposed to the weather.

The council agreed to participate in the 'No Mow May' scheme, which meant that the grass on the playing field, as well as any other suitable areas, would not be cut during May.

The decision last year to switch to meetings every two months to create space to clear some large items had worked successfully and a new structure of committees and working groups meant that it was now possible to return to monthly council meetings, which the council decided to do.

The council approved a statement of its priorities for the coming twelve month. This would be given more publicity at the annual parish meeting on 27 April.

A set of proposals on emergency planning, including the establishment of a new working group, was approved by council. This would ensure that this important subject would receive proper attention. As it will be a working group and not a committee, it would be possible for members of the public to join the working group and support its programme of work. The first meeting of the new working group would be held on 13 April.

It was agreed that further attention would be given to the new draft standing orders at a special parish council meeting, which would follow the planning committee meeting on 6 April.

An **Extraordinary Parish Council Meeting** had been held on 2 March. As the business of the meeting was confidential because it related to a staffing issue, the public were excluded. At the parish council meeting, it was decided that further discussion be deferred to the Staffing Committee on 20 April. Council also agreed to increase the membership of the Staffing Committee from four to five and Cllr Brown was elected to fill the new vacancy. (The other members of the committee are Cllrs Freake, Kneebone, Long and myself).

As usual, please look out for details of council meetings which will be published on the website and the council's three noticeboards, which are located opposite the Royal Oak, in the bus shelter opposite the train station and outside the main entrance to the playing field. *Colin Bridges*

Mild Days and Sunshine

A pleasant month for the most part, with daytime temperatures some 2C above the long-term average, and the highest for March since at least 1986. Our old friend, the hamlet of Treknow in North Cornwall distinguished itself again by recording the equal highest temperature nationally - 20.8C on the 25th.

Rainfall was close to average for the month, although it almost all fell in the first 12 days, with the rest of the month virtually dry. 1.16 inches fell on the 1st/2nd.

With winds from the East and South East predominating, especially in the second half of the month, sunshine hours were well above normal. Nationally, it was the second sunniest March in the series from 1919.

Memory Lane

2012 was only 10 years ago, and who can forget the London Olympics of that year? But what was the weather like? In a word, wet! Ironically, at the start of the year politicians, farmers and water industry officials held a "water summit" to look at supply concerns after a drought warning at the end of the previous year. In April, a hosepipe ban was introduced in the south of the country. That was the cue for the weather to change, and it quickly turned into the wettest spring and the wettest summer in 100 years.

The persistent wet weather was due to a shift in the jet stream to a much more southerly track than normal, bringing a succession of Atlantic low pressure systems and associated fronts across the southern half of the UK.

Flooding was widespread, with thousands of homes affected. There were landslides and cliff collapses across the south-west coast, with one fatality. Waterlogging made access to land difficult, reduced yields and caused some crops to rot. The NFU estimated the cost to Britain's farms amounted to £1.3 billion. Leisure activities didn't escape the disruption, including festival-goers stranded on the Isle of Wight. The Olympic Torch relay kept going despite the bad weather.

At Perranwell Station, April and June were particularly wet, with nearly two and a half times the normal rainfall. In those months, it rained on two thirds of the days, very unusual for what is normally our driest time of the year. The summer generally, through to August, was very wet, reflecting the national picture.

May the outdoor season prove as successful.






