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






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EDITORIAL

PARISH COUNCIL NOMINEE MEETING THURS APRIL 10th



Village Hall Thursday 10th April.

A hustings for the forthcoming parish council election was held in the village hall on Thursday 10th April. The event was organised and chaired by Mark Gripper, the editor of Perran News.

20 members of the village in attendance.

7 nominees presented in two minutes each their reasons for standing for a place on the Perranarworthal Parish Council.

2 nominees sent their apologies prior to the meeting.

Presentation in order of speaking (decided by lottery):

David Ward: A serving Parish Councillor, member of the Highways and Footpaths committees. Active member of village Community Shop. He serves to provide a better village, for prosperity and better use of community resources. He is excited by the possibilities for the village including the Village Hall plan. He is a Village Hall trustee.

Mark Pryor: Has served as Parish Councillor for 30 years. He is part of the Playing Field amalgamation steering group as well as the Planning Committee and a member of the staffing committee.

Bronwyn Freake: 14 years a resident in the village. She was previously a Parish Councillor and was Vice Chair. Her background is in Education and was part of the Neighbourhood planning group and Emergency Plan group. She is a team leader for the Community shop. She would like to deliver better links with the village school.

Lea Thomas: 20 years a resident and is a Parish Councillor. Her background is Local County Council Agriculture and Horticulture teams and is part of the Environment working group that leads Tidy Up teams.

Richard Holman: 30 years a resident and 5 years a Parish Councillor. He was part of the COVID Response team, chairs the Highways& Footpaths working group and is part of the Community Flood team.

Ashley Bridges: Grown up in the village. A Parish Councillor with links to the cricket club and school. Worked on projects that benefit the community including hedges, wider services for the village population and community safety. She wishes to provide support for younger members of the village and support for the school. She values the need for good communication and a more effective website including what the community require

Colin Bridges: Currently Chair of Parish Council. Formerly Chair of school governors and Chair of Village Hall trustees. Previous Parish Council aims: (1) Improve Parish Council communication, (2) Improve Parish Council leadership (3) Improve well-being of community. Future Parish Council aims: (1) Improve the way Parish Council do things and provide stability and respect for all. (2) Improve Parish Council teamwork and everyone pulling their weight. (3) Deliver better life opportunities for community.

Following the presentations there was one question for nominees provided by member of community: If elected what is your priority, passion or goal.? How will it benefit the community?

DW: Involvement of all community in Parish Council and Community shop.

LT: Achievement of other Parish Councils across the area exceed PWell. Why haven't we achieved? Why have we stagnated? How can we make the village fit for future generations?

BF: Closer links with village school (school council). There is a lot more to do. Neighbourhood plan is there. What will be done with it?

AB: Prioritise Parish Council Activities. Connection and communication. Provide infrastructure.

CB: Rebuild the Village Hall with community support. Provide a strategic plan. Make initiatives joined up. RH:Engagement of parishioners.

MP: Playing Field and Village Hall development and footpaths. No falling out between Parish Councillors.

Mark Gripper then invited questions from the community who attended the meeting but many of the contributions were statements or recommendations.

Are all Parish Councillors intending to stand for election?

The answer was yes, and BF and AH have been nominated to rejoin the Parish Council. That means there are 11 nominees but only 10 can be elected.

Community spirit needs to get going again to unite the village. Many contributions about involving younger members of the community, reinstating Hey Day, Fun day, Big Village Day, tea dance, Parish Council open days and how the Parish Council can reach out to the community. It was agreed the COVID stopped the community events, but that participation could be reintroduced through improved media links.

There was reference that this is a new start for the parish Council and that 'squabbling' had stopped. Working groups hadn't hit the mark in all cases, but a program of events could be initiated by a positive and active Parish Council.

The new Village Hall is seen as a central or focal point for the community.

It is acknowledged that there are many new members of the village community, and the population demographic is of an older age, and that younger members need a voice in the future of the village. There are many people from outside the village that make use of what is available in Perranwell.

Following a suggestion from the floor that slogans are effective, Mark Gripper concluded the meeting with a "tongue-in-cheek" suggestion that a slogan for the Parish Council could be 'Make Perranwell great again.'

With proactive, willing, positive parish councillors this is possible. There are strong candidate nominees. and he encouraged everyone to use their vote. He also encouraged those present to encourage those not present to read the Perran News to understand what is happening in the village and vote at the election.

DO YOU REMEMBER BIG VILLAGE?

At the meeting in the Village Hall on April 10th, when the audience was addressed by each of the candidates for election to the Parish Council on May 1st, mention was made by several of them of the wish to develop a greater community spirit and to involve residents of all ages in more village activities.

Many readers will remember the very successful Big Village events that took place, starting in 2013 and continuing until 2017. They were the result of an initiative first put forward by the Parish Council two years earlier. A small group of volunteers then agreed to take this forward. We met as a committee to plan the programme, and in the summer of 2013, the first event took place. The whole programme lasted one complete week and, on several days, there were even two separate events.

They were very well supported, many taking place in the Village Hall and all of them in or around the Village. They included talks on a variety of subjects, guided walks and garden visits, sporting and social events and occasions for dance, keep fit and music.

Such was the enthusiasm and interest that it was decided that in 2015, we would attempt to make Big Village last the whole month. We had learned that some residents had been away throughout the first BV event and we wished to avoid this in the future. Then, for 2017, we made the decision that the ideal length for BV would be two weeks and three weekends. We felt that we had found the correct formula. We started planning for the next BV event and then Covid intervened!

However, the lessons we learned are very valuable. A small team of enthusiastic and imaginative residents could easily resurrect this project, and I know that they would be supported by the Parish Council, probably even financially. All that is needed is the willingness of a few people representing residents of all ages, from the youngest to the oldest, to meet, plan and organise.

How about it? The whole village will benefit.

Predominant Wind direction: **Dry, and sunnier than normal**

In stark contrast to March 2024, March 2025 was generally dry and bright. High pressure was in charge for much of the month, with rainfall 38% of the average for March, only 2011 and 2012 being drier since 2006. Meanwhile, sunshine hours were above average, but not by a large margin. Nationally, England experienced the 6th driest March since records began, and the sunniest March on record.

East

Day-time temperatures were near normal, however night-time temperatures were a degree or so below. Cooler spells from 1st to the 5th and from 11th to the 18th were balanced out by warmer periods, especially towards the end of the month.

Wind direction was generally from the East quarter.

Why is the Sky Blue?

And for that matter, why is the sea blue? I'm certain that I used to know, but when grandchildren start asking questions like these, I felt I had to look up the answers to be absolutely sure of my facts.

So, with the sea, it's all to do with the selective absorption and scattering of sunlight by water molecules. Sunlight is made up of all the colours of the rainbow, each with a different wavelength. When sunlight enters the ocean, water molecules preferentially absorb longer wavelengths (red, orange, yellow and green), while shorter wavelengths of light - particularly blue - are scattered. This scattered blue light is then reflected back towards our eyes, making the sea appear blue.

It's the same principle with the sky. When sunlight enters the atmosphere, it meets tiny molecules of nitrogen and oxygen. These molecules scatter the light in all directions. As blue light has a shorter wavelength than other colours (such as red and yellow), it is scattered more effectively than other colours, making the sky appear blue. Our eyes are also more sensitive to blue light.

What about the red or orange sky colours seen at sunrise and sunset? Red light waves are scattered the least by atmospheric gas molecules. So at sunrise and sunset, when the sunlight travels a long path through the atmosphere to our eyes, the blue light has already been scattered, leaving mostly red and yellow light waves. The result is that the sunlight takes on an orange or red hue, which we can see reflected from clouds or other objects as a colourful sunset or sunrise.

April Update

After a very pleasant start to the month, dry, sunny and on the warm side, the weather has turned with a vengeance. Rainfall on the night of 14/15th was 0.83 of an inch, surpassed on the 15th when I recorded 1.71 inches. The 15th was also noticeably cold, the temperature only getting up to 8C with a stiff northerly wind. Not a nice day.

A NEW COMMUNITY STORE IS COMING....BUT WE NEED EVERYONE'S SUPPORT TO MAKE IT THRIVE.

The eagle-eyed observers amongst you will have noticed the existing store is excitingly taking shape. On Wednesday 2nd April Jan Moore invited the community stores committee to view the amazing new premises. Following this, the committee members held a meeting to discuss the future strategy and design a more efficient operating model.

We are currently aiming for late June to make the move from our temporary location back into the old store. Customers can expect to see our existing range of essential items, a broader coffee and takeaway offering, more products from local suppliers and a small space to promote our community village culture.

However, for your community store to survive we need your support.

The store is owned by the community of Perranwell and relies on two key elements.... which are a continuous supply of volunteers and customers.

Volunteers: We have a fabulous group of volunteers, but we require a larger pool of volunteers for the new store. If you are able to help, pop in and speak to us Shortly we will be writing to all of our 124 shareholders inviting them to make themselves available for one or more shifts over the course of the year in their community store.

Customers: Currently only 20 percent of our community regularly use the store. We need to increase this if your store is to survive for future years. Whether you commit to buying one particular product from us, visit us weekly or just pop in for a tasty treat when strolling around the village....we'd love to see more of you!

We are planning to recruit and introduce a fully expensed "Store Standards Manager" to coincide with the opening of the new store. The role is 9 hours per week (across any days of choice) and is designed to support the running of the store with consistency. If you are interested and would like more details about this role, please contact one of our committee members.
