

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT: JUNE 2025

A warning, dear readers. This report does not just explain what your parish council can do for you. Rather, it asks what you can do for your community. Be prepared.



One of the hottest topics in the parish at the moment is **speeding**, which seems to be mentioned in one form or another at almost every meeting. Our local Speedwatch group, coordinated by Stuart Douglas, mounts frequent sessions and the good news is that the proportion of vehicles exceeding the speed limit (normally the 20mph limit) has been gradually declining. But that still leaves a significant number of drivers who do exceed the limit. Various culprits are identified, such as parents rushing to drop children off at school, commuters rushing home and drivers diverted through the village when the A39 is closed, although that usually occasions traffic jams that have an opposite effect to speeding. Whatever the motivation, speeding results in distress for pedestrians and occasionally accidents. The question is: what can be done about it? This was discussed at a recent meeting of the Community Liaison Working Group.

Although the police had been holding monthly surgeries in the village hall, the chairman had extended an invitation to the police to attend meetings of this working group to help ensure a good working relationship between the police and the parish council. The meeting was addressed by PCSO Mark Canvin (who was substituting for PC Helen Newton).

PCSO Canvin welcomed the opportunity for the police to work with the parish council. He said that the police were aware of speeding issues in the parish, especially on School Hill at drop-off and pick-up times. He explained that "hard measures", such as police enforcement, detector vans, speed monitors and Speedwatch, if it had sufficient volunteers, were all part of the answer, although police resources to support such activities were extremely limited. The meeting was reminded that photo or video evidence of speeding drivers could also be submitted to the police via Operation Snap on the police website. However, the police also wanted to encourage the community to adopt a wider range of "soft measures" which had been shown to be equally effective at reducing speeding, if not more so. These included:

- large notices at the village perimeter advertising a "community pledge" to reduce traffic speed
- posters designed by schoolchildren enlarged as street signs and placed in prominent positions
- the placement of figures that might suggest to drivers that their behaviour was being observed, such as the use of life-size scarecrow police officers or lollipop ladies or other characters (being careful to ensure that highway visibility was not obstructed)
- even placing empty boxes painted yellow on poles which suggested that they might contain speed cameras.

In other words, rather than rely on the police, the community was being encouraged to take more responsibility to reduce speeding by changing the local culture. These suggestions were welcomed by the working group. Following the meeting, I met the headteacher who agreed to explore ways in which the school might participate, particularly with posters and figures on School Hill. Further discussion will be held in the Highways & Public Rights of Way Working Group.

What can you do to help? Would you be willing to display a poster in your garden, especially if you live on one of the main roads (taking care, of course, not to obstruct highway visibility)? Would you be willing to construct and display a scarecrow or some other figure that might cause drivers just to think twice about speeding? Would you be willing to volunteer for the Speedwatch team so that they can operate more frequently? If you would be willing to do any of these things then either come along to the monthly meetings of the Highways & Public Rights of Way Working Group, drop an email to the Clerk or speak to any of the parish councillors. The message is clear: if you are concerned about speeding, then don't leave it to somebody else to do something. Get involved.

Another key issue is <u>Neighbourhood Watch</u> in the parish which has largely fallen into disuse. The local Neighbourhood Watch coordinator (Louisa Inch) was unable to continue in this role and had hoped that a replacement could be found. (Thank you, Louisa, for your work in the past on Neighbourhood Watch). Many of the

Neighbourhood Watch signs around the parish have been broken and regrettably indicate that Neighbourhood Watch is no longer taken seriously. The question is: should the local Neighbourhood Watch scheme be revived? The website for the Devon & Cornwall Community Watch Association explains that "Although Neighbourhood Watch is all about helping to cut crime and reducing the fear of crime, it's equally about helping to combat loneliness, caring for the more vulnerable members of our communities and improving the social atmosphere and our community spirit by bringing people together with a shared goal."

At the recent meeting of the Community Liaison Working Group, PCSO Canvin advised that areas that publicized Neighbourhood Watch generally saw crime rates 50% lower than other areas. The main impact of Neighbourhood Watch was created by a high degree of visibility of Neighbourhood Watch signs and window stickers. Dog walkers were also very effective informal Neighbourhood Watch wardens. In other words, a large part of Neighbourhood Watch is provide reassurance to those who might feel most vulnerable. Now that suggests a clear overlap with the work of our own Emergency Planning Working Group which has put considerable effort into producing a list of vulnerable people in the parish, based on work initially undertaken during the Covid crisis of 2020.

If Neighbourhood Watch is to be revived then a new coordinator would be needed. The role is not very onerous but would mean acting as the focal point. So, again, the challenge is obvious: if you think that our local Neighbourhood Watch should be revived, would you be willing to volunteer as the coordinator? If so, then please either speak to one of the parish councillors or contact the Clerk.

Next, let's discuss bums or rather, where to put them – <u>benches and seats</u>. The parish council is keen to encourage walking as a way of promoting health and wellbeing, as well as helping to tackle climate change by reducing the use of motor vehicles for short journeys. However, walking is often made considerably more enjoyable by occasional stops either to catch one's breath or just enjoy the view. To assist this, the parish council is willing and able to provide more benches and stopping-off points. Personally, I'd like to see a seat at the war memorial which has recently been cleaned and refurbished so the lettering is clear, fresh gravel has been laid, planters have been added and decorations were added to commemorate VE day. Some figures of soldiers will soon be installed. Somewhere to sit, perhaps on a bench or even a rock, might encourage one to dally and reflect on past sacrifices. However, where are your favourite spots? It would be great to receive suggestions as to where seats might be best placed, especially along footpaths. Do you have any ideas? If so, please let the Clerk or any parish councillor know. So there you have it – three opportunities to contribute to your community. I shall look forward to seeing the responses.

As usual, members of the public are welcome to attend meetings of the council and its working groups. Look out for details on the noticeboards and website.

A Surprisingly Dull Month

The first half of June was cloudy, on the cool side, and wet. Apart from the third week, the cloudiness continued, however temperatures were higher for the rest of the month, so much so that overall they averaged 1.5C above normal. Despite the warm weather, sunshine hours were about a third lower than average for June, very disappointing.

Meanwhile, after a wet first half of the month, the second half was virtually dry with less than a third of an inch falling after the 14th.

Winds were predominantly from a westerly quarter.

Nationally, for the UK, it was the second warmest June on record.

How Weather influences the Property Market

A recently published book "100 Words for Rain" by Alex Johnson, contains many fascinating facts about the British weather. One relates to a three year survey carried out by a well-known conveyancing specialist which found that:

- 1) Rain has no effect on the number of house viewings or offers on properties.
- 2) First-time buyers are more active when temperatures are between 7-10C and 15-21C, i.e. not too hot and not too cold.
- 3) High temperatures encourage people to put their homes on the market, especially during July and August.

I wonder if the above holds true locally?

July Update

The weather has been dry so far, and temperatures have been on the up as we experience the hottest days of the year so far. We're not there yet, but it feels very much like we're experiencing drought conditions. Since February, overall rainfall has not been particularly low (albeit March and May were dry), however the rain has fallen in concentrated periods, with extended dry spells in between.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT

Hello all,

Cornwall Council business quietens down in August, but I'll still be around so please get in touch any time: cllr.ruth.gripper@cornwall.gov.uk

I've been enjoying getting stuck in to the new role - thank you to everyone who has been in touch. Whether it's planning, road safety, buses, abandoned vehicles, recycling (just some of the topics people have been in touch about!), I'm always happy to take these matters up for you. You can also report many issues directly to the Council online at www.cornwall.gov.uk/report-something



While some issues are easily dealt with, others are more complicated – such as the flooding at Bissoe Bridge, which the parish council and affected residents have been plugging away at for some time. I joined a recent meeting of the working group and will do what I can to support their efforts to find a solution. Work has begun on the development of nine new affordable bungalows on Trewedna Lane. Some will be shared ownership and some will be social rent, but all are aimed at meeting the housing need for local people. The rented properties will be allocated through the Council's Homechoice register. There's a local connection requirement, so 'first dibs' will go to people connected to Perranwell parish who are in band A, then band B, and so on, and then it cascades out to neighbouring parishes. The shared ownership properties also have eligibility and local connection requirements - if you are interested in these please register with Coastline.

The Community Area Partnership has held its first meeting of the new term. This is a group which brings together neighbouring parishes from the Falmouth and Penryn area. Travel and transport, health and wellbeing and climate and environment were agreed as priorities in the initial discussion and the Perranwell reps had lots of ideas to contribute!

At a personal level, I am really pleased to have been nominated as co-chair of the Ageing Well Partnership Board – this brings together members of the public along with different public sector representatives to try and make sure Cornwall is a great place to get older. I will also be serving on the health and adult social care scrutiny committee – more on that in future columns I expect! And a highlight for me this week was visiting Cornwall Air Ambulance who have recently taken delivery of their new helicopter. It was a useful visit for all involved and really humbling and inspiring to get up close and hear directly from the team about the incredible work they do.

Full Council will have met by the time you read this – I am one of the supporters on a cross-party motion on the topic of abandoned boats. Over the past year or more volunteers have been working to highlight this issue and push practical solutions, and I hope the motion will receive support from all sides in the council chamber.

Finally, Safer Cornwall is keen to hear residents' views on crime and anti-social behaviour. The annual survey is open until the end of August so if you have any comments, please do take 10minutes to share your views: https://letstalk.cornwall.gov.uk/safer-cornwall-have-your-say

Thanks to Jan Moore's fantastic efforts in making it happen, we have now relocated back to the old Post Office premises. The prefab building did its job due to the Parish Council's support, but we're now moving to a high-quality building with lots more space and a community area where customers can sit and chat (hopefully whilst enjoying takeway coffees and cake slices!)



We are overjoyed that we have reached this point – far sooner than we had dared to hope when we set out on this adventure. This has been made possible by the dedication of all our volunteers, the support of our shareholders and the generosity of the new owner of the shop building. Perranwell Station can be very proud and we look forward to this exciting new chapter.

The new shop has everything that we stocked in the temporary one, including our very popular range of cakes and a new coffee machine. It also continues our commitment to quality local suppliers. Opening hours have remained the same.

One new development is encouraging more of our customers to switch to card payments which is less complex to manage and can ultimately save us costs despite the card fees.

Of course, it will still depend on residents using it as much as they can and we hope this new start will see even more locals choosing to shop with us (we think only about 20% of the Perranwell population buy from us). It is really essential if we are going to keep this venture viable well into the future. Similarly, we're always on the lookout for more volunteers.

We have planned an official launch event on 16th August for key stakeholders and the press.


Store standards Manager

In addition to this element, Graeme also completes a number of hours per week as an unpaid volunteer both serving in the shop and doing various other tasks which support the business.



We would like to say special thanks to Caroline Lawrence, Brett Nelson and Ian Halford who won't be leaving but will move to back-up roles, filling in when gaps arise. Their commitment, great work and fun they have all brought to the community has been greatly appreciated.



Products

Whilst we're a little late in doing so, we want to say a big thank you to Pryor's farm for supplying potatoes to the shop for free for a full year. Whilst we now have to pay for them, they're still a popular product and selling local produce remains a priority for us (even if its only a rounding error for Pryors!).

Please note that we're selling an absolutely wonderful book of poems and short stories written by 10-year-old children from Perranwell School and organised by Paul Stewart. All proceeds are going to charities selected by the children and the quality of the writing – covering what children think of us adults – is both impressive and surprising. A nice little gift for family and friends.

Financial Results

We have now completed our first full year of operations as a Community Benefit Society. Whilst the website contains full and detailed results, key points are as follows:

Annual sales of £104k

Gross margin of £22k (21%)

Limited overheads of £7k, resulting in a profit of £15k

Cash generation of £13k (slightly less than profits due primarily to the capital costs associated with the new premises).

Likely future performance

We expect and hope for an improvement in turnover of about 10% due to the superior location of our new premises. Whilst increasing costs from rent and store standards will more than offset this, we estimate sufficient funds to:

- Replace equipment where necessary
- Pay shareholders a biannual return via the prize draw
- Continue generating cash for local good causes

We currently have a £50k cash balance which is increasing each month and one of our upcoming tasks will be to agree what we do with it in line with the principles of our Community Benefit Society. Note that anybody can have read-only, real-time access to our finance system on request to the Management Committee and merely by providing an email address.

AN UNEXPECTED TURN IN AN UNDISTINGUISHED CRICKETING LIFE

A friend of mine who plays in the Cornwall Over 60's 2nd eleven blagged me in to playing, as they were a man short, and being the cricket tart I am I found it difficult to refuse, despite it being 45 overs per innings. I haven't played more than 20 overs for about 5 years.

This is the match I played in on Tuesday July 1st and this should show a link to the scorecard and more importantly the bowling figures.

A 0700 departure from Perranwell, in another player's car sitting beside a charming, but slightly dribbly Welsh collie dog in the back seat, since the front was occupied by another player. Nice chaps, good company, never met them, or the dog before. Doing between 75 and 85 most of the way on the A30 / M5 we were unsurprisingly first to arrive at Croesyceiliog CC. Cwmbran near Newport at 1100, 2 hours before the game started, despite stopping for half an hour at Taunton to stretch the dog's legs, and unstretch three mature gent's bladders. The pub adjoining the cricket ground was curiously named "The Upper Cock". Was this an omen for a mature Cornwall player's field of dreams?

Expectations were not high since Cricket Wales, the opposition, beat all the other south and south west counties at this age group by a comfortable margin as a rule. They did proper warmups before the match, which was a little intimidating, while my teammates gave reports on their various injuries. This was a sensible tactic in view of the extreme humidity, and I am sure our endeavours would have been the poorer for this unnecessary early waste of valuable energy.

The captain was given a simple task to win the toss and bat first in anticipation of our team not surviving the full 45 overs and enabling an early departure. He lost the toss, and we had to field. Much grumbling.

It was warm and humid, but it was mostly overcast, so it was just about tolerable, thank goodness.

The captain kindly, or possibly in desperation, asked me to bowl at about over 11. He clearly did not have a great selection of proper bowlers and those they had seemed to be limping from strains in the previous week's match in Wiltshire.

I was not expecting this. One of the opening batters was set with 25 runs. My run up is a single step, and I just try and bowl at the wickets at a good length. No spin, no swing, no clever stuff like that. In my third over the set batsman managed to let the ball hit a finger where there was no batting glove padding, so he had to take his glove off and shake his hand about a bit as serious players do. An apparently trivial injury.

However, three balls later, softened up, he missed a straight ball on his off stump and the bail came flying off with lights flashing and the stump also illuminated. First time I have ever played with IPL wickets. A truly magic moment for me, which also incidentally led my teammates to develop a naively extravagant view of my modest abilities.

I bowled 5 overs 1 wicket for 25 runs as you cans see on the scorecard. The umpire gave favourable comment on my energy saving single step run up also which was nice.

Wales, sadly, went on to make 223 during the 3 hours we were fielding using all 45 overs. One gloomy member of the team had forecast 400 before the match, based on past experience, so it could have been a lot worse I suppose. We struggled to get 110 with me batting number 11 and being c&b for nought.

We had a good tea and everyone, including the opposition, were friendly and hospitable. I had a good day out.

My friend drove me home in a different car, which went nearly as fast as the morning trip, but there was no dog, and no dribble. Arrived home after a long day in Wales at 10.30pm. I was shovelled out of the car just able to stagger up the drive.

The Cornwall Over 60 second team at least has impressive mileage figures to away games averaging about 150 to 200 miles each way. Shame they don't seem to be able to match it in the run's column.



One of my more able teammates suggested I might like to join him in an over 70's match the day after next in Worcester, another 250 mile road trip. Another 500 miles on the M5. No thank you but kind of you to ask. What is it they say? "Old cricketers never die they only lose their bails"

I now have a rather belated County Cricket debut on my Sporting CV and I like to think it was also an International Match between two proud Celtic nations. Something, I would never have dreamed of in a month of Sundays, or Saturdays.

Sadly, if I want a team-cap I will need to play another 49 games and pay for it myself from the CCC merchandise website.

I fear I won't have sufficient years left to put the games in. Thanks for being so interested. I think all cricket clubs should have flashing lights in their bails.
