

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT: OCTOBER 2025

Recently, I was accosted by a local resident who asked, in a rather accusatory manner, "What has the parish council actually done?" The tone of the question indicated a high degree of scepticism accompanied by a dispiritingly low expectation of a convincing reply.



This reminded me and will, I'm sure, remind others of a certain age of the blessed Monty Python from the 60s and 70s, including the memorable question, "What have the Romans ever done for us?" To which there was, of course, a fairly full reply. Well, read on, dear citizens, to learn the various ways in which that local resident's question about the parish council might be answered. For those of a masochistic inclination, a full list of the powers and duties of the parish council is available on the website.

The new Hedge Maintenance Policy has been approved which aims to see a long-term improvement in hedge maintenance across the parish (with thanks to Cllr Ashley Bridges for the work that she has put into this). The policy is available on the website and, if your property shares a boundary with a highway or public right of way, such as a footpath, bridleway or byway, you might care to read it. By the way, a little birdie told me that Cllr Pryor has been flailing about again. Busy chap!

You'll recall that Cllr Bron Freake had proposed <u>an extension of the 30mph limit on the A39</u> from the western end of the current 30mph zone through Stickenbridge to the junction with Frog Hill. This was supported by the parish council but initially rejected by Cormac, who are responsible for highways. The parish council has considered this further and decided not to take no for answer. It has now agreed to approach neighbouring parish councils to see whether they share our concern and what the next steps might be. There are good reasons for pursuing this further as traffic surveys of the area are quite old and there has been, and will continue to be, new housing development in the Stickenbridge area. Parish councillors often need to be persistent to effect change and this is a good example of where persistence is necessary.

Meanwhile, the parish council is proceeding with a proposal to install many more <u>speed awareness signs</u> <u>in the 20mph zone</u> to encourage drivers to slow down. Local residents have made it abundantly clear that the parish council should see a reduction in speeding as a high priority and the police suggested extra signs would be effective. A schedule of potential locations for additional signs has been prepared and will be sent to Cormac for approval. Some anxiety has been expressed about the proliferation of street signs in the village, but on average there will be one new sign every 400 yards or so, so it should not seem overwhelming.

If permission is given for the extra speed awareness signs to be installed, <u>our Speedwatch team</u> will be monitoring the impact. Stuart Douglas, our local Speedwatch coordinator, would dearly love more volunteers for Speedwatch sessions, so if you would obtain a frisson of pleasure from observing the horrified faces of errant motorists who've just been caught speeding (just kidding!), please get in touch with Stuart via the Clerk. I've said it before, but I'll say it again: if you think it's important, don't leave it to others – volunteer!

It was pleasing to receive correspondence from the cricket club announcing that their new electronic scoreboard had been installed as the parish council had given a grant of £500 towards the cost. One of the key roles of the parish council is to provide <u>financial support for local groups</u> and projects and the parish council is always pleased to receive applications for grants (the application form is on the website). While grants are usually quite modest, they are often vital in ensuring the continuing operation of groups or projects.

As I'm sure you know, the Community Store made a welcome return during the summer to the beautifully restored old shop premises in the centre of the village, thanks in large part to the generosity of Jan Moore who had purchased and renovated the property and granted a lease to the community store to use most

of the ground floor (the remainder of the ground floor and the upper floor was allocated for domestic accommodation). It came as something of a surprise, therefore, when the property was put up for sale. In my previous report, I said that the parish council was watching developments closely and would be considering any steps it may be able to take to help secure the long-term future of the store. Two parish councillors (ClIrs Annie Hewitt and Dave Ward) also serve on the shop committee. Since the previous report, David Podd has resigned as chair of the store committee and Annie Hewitt has stepped up into the role to replace him. I'm sure that everybody would wish to thank David for his enormous contribution to the creation of the store in the first place, it's initial two years in the portacabin on the village hall site and the subsequent transfer to the renovated premises. I'm pleased to say that David will continue to be involved in community initiatives. In the meantime, I have had a very helpful conversation with Jan to gain a better understanding about the future of the store. For the time being, the store has a secure five-year lease, but the parish council is going to explore the possibility of registering the store as "an asset of community value" under the Localism Act 2011. If Cornwall Council agrees to register the application, it would give the parish council the right to bid for the property should it come up for sale again on the open market.

What the community store needs more than anything else, of course, is customers. The happy shop customer interface operatives ('assistants' to you and me) are waiting to be rushed off their feet. If you are a regular customer, thank you! If you haven't yet visited the store, please make a point of doing so this month. You will be pleasantly surprised, especially by the community corner where coffee and cake can be consumed - it is a lovely seating area. It is vital to the community that we retain a thriving local shop.

A Big Village Planning Group has been established by the parish council to commission and coordinate a full programme of events between now and the end of 2026. Many people fondly remember the Big Village programmes that were run about 10 to 15 years ago, and some people remember even more fondly the Hey Days of the past. Although we hope everyone gets a lot of pleasure out of the new programme, the principal aim is to raise as much money as possible for the redevelopment of the village hall. Look out for further details and please support as many events as you possibly can. Also, please get in touch if you would like to offer to organise an event, such as an open garden tea party or a display of your favourite hobby. People always love being nosey!

Talking of community initiatives, did you know that Sue Kneebone has opened a very successful recreation area at Chytroon Farm in the centre of the village? It's slightly hidden from public view, which is part of its attraction, like a secret garden. You'll find a small chalet serving refreshments, a wide range of pre-loved clothing, including children's clothing with part of the proceeds being donated to the school, and plenty of play equipment for kids in the field that runs down to the stream. It's open every day of the week except Wednesday and Thursday, although it is sometimes closed during inclement weather. Well worth a visit.

The parish council has decided that <u>regular Tidy-up Days</u> will be run on the first Saturday of each month, organised by Cllrs Lea Thomas and Ashley Bridges and supported by Cormac with the loan of equipment. The next event will be held on Saturday 1st November, so look out for details. Meet 10.00 am at the village hall. Areas to be tidied up will include Arworthal Meadows, the station car park and the telephone kiosk near The Norway Inn which was recently purchased by the parish council. If you know of an area that needs tidying up, please tell us so that it can be added to the list. And then join in. What else would you rather be doing on a Saturday morning?

Work continues on other matters such as <u>Chyvogue Lane</u> and <u>flooding at Bissoe Bridge</u>. Updates will appear in future reports. Also, please see the important announcement about this year's <u>Christmas</u> decorations.

I often say that <u>members of the public are welcome to attend meetings of the council</u> and its working groups and generally become involved in the work of the parish council. Look out for details on the noticeboards and website. While members of the public can speak freely throughout working group

meetings, until now any member of the public attending a parish council meeting has only been permitted to speak during an item called 'Public Participation' and, strictly speaking, should not speak throughout the rest of the meeting. This has changed with an amendment to standing order 14(b) which now says, "Members of the public may make representations, answer questions and give evidence at a meeting which they are entitled to attend either during the period of time designated for public participation or at other times at the discretion, and with the permission, of the chairman." This has introduced a welcome degree of flexibility.

So, dear reader, I hope that helps to answer the question with which this report began.





PERRAN-AR-WORTHAL LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

An introduction to Cornish Crosses by Andrew Langdon

Andrew is an expert on Cornish Crosses who spoke to the group on **23rd Sept 2025** about his ongoing research.



There are over 650 medieval crosses in Cornwall including fragments. Ninety percent of them are granite found in areas where there is granite bedrock and on early ecclesiastical sites. In the East they are Latin in style although inscriptions are often difficult to decipher. Many were used as a preaching cross to denote a place for outdoor worship. There are a group of panelled crosses interlaced with knot-work, e.g. St Neots late 9th century, and a group in Penwith with a crucifix e.g. St Buryan. Many broken crosses have been rebuilt and incorporated into the fabric of 15th and 16th century churches, e.g. Cardinham.

By the 11th and 12th century crosses became more plain, e.g. Penzance. In some areas crosses were carved with trefoil holes and some have been re-used as gateposts and stiles. The tallest is at Quethiock 1883. This was found in 2 sections with part in the churchyard wall and the other used as a gatepost, but when they were rejoined reached a height of 13 ft 4 in. There are wayside crosses developed from the12th century which were carved by a local stone maker and so were more individual in style, e.g. Camborne, which was made out of Polyphant stone and guarded the way to the church.

At St Buryan the cross marks a crossroads; others mark the route to a church or holy well or are used as a boundary marker. Late medieval crosses were often carefully engraved, e.g. with the image of the annunciation at St Mawgan in Pydar, and the 15th and 16th century lantern crosses in St Ives.

COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

One of the parts of being a councillor which is perhaps less visible to residents is what's known as scrutiny. I thought I'd use this month's piece to say a bit about my work in this area. I'm a member of two scrutiny committees, covering health and adult social care, and corporate finance and performance.

These committees exist to provide constructive challenge within the council. They have a mix of councillors from different political parties, roughly equivalent to the council as a whole, and we spend time digging into things in more detail than we can in a full council meeting. We ask questions and offer suggestions, to improve decision-making and hold the council's Cabinet and senior officers to account. We can make formal recommendations and produce reports (a bit like Select Committees in Parliament).

This month's health committee meeting had lots on the agenda, but one important topic we covered at length was the state of dentistry in Cornwall. This is a major concern for residents and has knock-on effects at other areas of the NHS, like GP surgeries and A&E. There are problems with recruitment (which Brexit has made worse) and a waiting list that doesn't work. We discussed the steps being taken locally to try to improve this and attract more dentists to work in Cornwall. Fundamentally, though, the problem is the national contract, and we will press government for changes to the NHS dentistry contract with fairer funding that recognises the challenges of rural areas like ours.

Corporate finance and performance might sound rather dry, but it's important! Not only does it cover financial performance, but also how the council relates to residents. I'm one of just two women on the 10-person committee, and I do think it's important that there are a range of perspectives and experiences in the room. This month we looked at the Cornwall draft digital inclusion strategy. Digital inclusion affects people of all ages – more than one in ten young people nationally don't have access to a device suitable for learning. I asked whether we are being ambitious enough in our targets for children in school, and I'm pleased the officers agreed to take another look at this.

You can find all the committees and their agendas online, and meetings are livestreamed. Members of the public are welcome to attend, and you can ask questions yourself – but they do need to be submitted in advance. Details at https://democracy.cornwall.gov.uk/mgListCommittees.aspx



"Look at him working, darning his socks in the night when there's nobody there" Lennon/McCartney



Jenkins knows Halloween doesn't fall at this time of year by chance. No, my love. He had been enjoying the dry autumnal weather but the growing darkness and

seasonal decay was always eerie. He had great tributaries of memory that would cascade evermore as dawn yawed wider, yes, my love. His Mother and Father, their lives snuffed out like candles at a working man's bedside, while dead leaves shuffled the dark paths of the family home. Back at age 18 Jenkins had fallen in love and met an October pain he was wholly unprepared for and he had suffered for many hours, alone in the Bargus dark. He thought that nobody else could ever suffer heartbreak so badly but then, as Kafka said, "one can only view life through the keyhole of one's own existence".

Jenkins used to sit down by Jacob's Well and smoke rolling tobacco. Now he goes there to play on his new trials motorcycle.

"House of Day, House of Night" was written by Olga Tokarczuk who is a winner of the Nobel Prize in Literature. It meanders through the lives of some folks in a remote Polish village and really feels, well, a little like straying into a dream. The Brothers Grimm, I'm not overly familiar with, God or lack of God, it's a beautiful book. Saint Soliticitous, my love.

"And the sun of October, summery on the hills shoulder" Dylan Thomas, A Poem in October. A Jenkins favourite.

"Though the town below lay leaved in October blood"

"The Subtle Art of Not Giving a ***k" is written by Mark Manson and kinda climbed out of the Waterstones shelves with such a title. A Counterintuitive Approach to Living a Good Life, it's basically psychology in a raw and playful form, good fun.

Jenkins was just doing his article. On her deathbed his Mothers grudges had shone as heartbreaking vanity. He remembered his father leaving the house for a Doctors visit. It was the last time he went out of this kitchen door and locked it behind him. The family home, 40 years maintaining the mundic block with layers of paint, the hours spent cutting grass and trimming and cutting firewood, the huge slabs of income he spent to keep the property damp free and pleasantly inhabitable. He left that final time with no ceremony, becoming another spectre of the Bargus dark...

Jenkins had done his article.

"Inside the house there was no sound save the ticking of the mantel clock in the front room. He went out and shut the door... He walked out on the prairie and stood holding his hat like some supplicant to the darkness over them all and he stood there for a long time."

Focus Areas for This Month

This month, we have chosen to concentrate on two key areas: the structure of our pricing and our volunteers

External Price Comparisons

"Its all about swings and roundabouts.... But overall, we fare well against everyone"

We have become aware that some parishioners are unfairly spreading misinformation concerning our pricing. It is important to clarify that over 60% of our products are price-marked by our main supplier. This means our prices are consistent with thousands of similar stores across the UK and in some cases cheaper. An example of this is our freshly brewed take out coffee at £2.50 and our locally handmade cakes represent amazing value at £2.50 for a very generous slice.

We would like to extend our gratitude to Debbie Pass, one of our shareholders, who has dedicated significant time and effort to collect comparative pricing data. This has been a time-consuming exercise but nevertheless an important one which gives us the confidence in our approach to pricing. This is not a one-off exercise but will be an ongoing task.

Conclusions from the Price Comparison

- PCS is highly competitive against Waitrose, with twice as many products offered at a lower price compared to those priced higher.
- There are numerous products being sold by us for less than other large supermarkets e.g. Sainsburys and Tesco
- Overall, we are confident that we provide good and fair prices to our customers, with our lack of labour costs largely balancing out the superior buying power of bigger supermarkets.
- Our prices are particularly appealing in the Soft Drinks, confectionery, takeaway coffee and cake categories.

Our comparative data will soon be available online for readers to review. We would like to express our gratitude to Debbie for her ongoing dedication to this demanding initiative.

We also reaffirm our steadfast commitment to local suppliers; currently, we source from 15 suppliers, all located within a five-mile radius. This principle has always been integral to our values, and although it may result in marginally higher prices of a few pence on certain items, we believe this is more than offset by the ethical and sustainable benefits achieved.

Winter Warmer Promotion

From November through February, guests can enjoy even greater value with our Winter Warmer Promotion: coffee and cake for £4.75.

Volunteers

The success of our shop is largely attributed to our exceptional volunteers. Since relocating to our current premises, we have welcomed five additional volunteers, and we extend our appreciation for their dedication. Thanks to both new and longstanding volunteers, we now conduct comprehensive stock checks monthly on Sundays, which significantly contribute to our operations.

It has been rewarding to witness the development of friendship groups among volunteers, illustrating that volunteering offers much more than simply assisting in the shop—it is a deeply enriching experience. Customers frequently remark on the welcoming service provided, and that traditional standards of customer care continue to be highly valued.

The following account is presented by two of our experienced volunteers, who were invited to share their perspective on working in the shop.

There's no time for 'Monday morning blues' -

The beginning of each trading week at our community shop marks a period of activity for volunteers in every capacity. The routine includes opening procedures such as unlocking the shop, turning on the lights, operating the till, preparing the coffee machine, monitoring chiller temperatures, arranging cakes for display, and ensuring cleanliness—preparing the premises for a successful day.

The bread arrives, another check, invoice and dates, we're low on dairy produce, thankfully Roddas' van arrives and maybe Trevarthens' with lovely meats. More deliveries, beautiful flowers, fresh produce, perhaps prescriptions. Serving customers, the priority, offer to help, time for a chat.

Perhaps we can grab ourselves some coffee, whoops! not yet, a walking group here for a warm drink, cake and a deserved rest.

Our three hours has flown by, happily two replacement volunteers arrive, a few minutes to handover and we're off until next Monday morning.

It has been busy, fun, rewarding and especially great to spend time with each other as well as our customers.

We hope this account might encourage others to come forward and help. There are various roles within the shop: Regular shift volunteer

Ad hoc volunteer including helping with the main stock delivery on a Tuesday

Stock take volunteer- 1 Sunday per month

Store opener or closer- typically a 30-minute task, required as needed

Finally, a big thank you to all those parishioners who do use us. We are aware that our opening hours may preclude some of you, as a voluntary organisation it is impractical to extend our opening hours. It is worth remembering how desolate the village felt without a shop- we feel that together we have brought the heart of the village back to life.
