





The Parish Council met on the 29th May 2019, this also included the Annual Parish Meeting at which the Chairman gives his report. As there are parishioners who did not hear this on the night, this is what Councillor Brown had to say;

“Looking back at previous reports there is a recurring theme, Cornwall Council continues to have to make stringent cuts to services as the amount of money it receives from Central Government has diminished. Once again the Parish Council has had to look at taking on responsibilities that would previously have been shouldered by Cornwall Council, but which it no longer has funds to continue doing. There is always going to be controversy about this, people say that it is a double taxation, the money for services is already taken in the form of the council tax and then their local parish also puts up the precept to cover those same services. Unfortunately for this council, as for all the others, it is a case of “damned if you do, and damned if you don’t! The Parish Council has taken the view that by budgeting to do the work that Cornwall Council will not do, at least it will get done. The lack of funds is something that people will need to take up with Cornwall Council itself or Central Government.

I would like to thank my fellow councillors for the time and commitment they put in. As we have seen from other sources, it is not always easy to find volunteers for anything within the parish. It used to be that the parish council met once a month and that was it, now we have a separate meeting for planning, playing field and finance, to name but a few. There are also site meetings, training sessions and attendance at other organisations events. I would like to thank Councillor Angwin for his perseverance with the Community Network, which must have tried his patience on several occasions, also to the Vice Chairman, Councillor Pryor, who has represented the Parish Council at several events, in my absence. I would also like to thank all the other people who give up their free time, the Perranwell Centre trustees, the Speedwatch team, especially Stuart Douglas, the NDP steering group, Friends of Perranwell Station, the WI, the budding Christmas Lights Committee, and the Big Village committee members. Hopefully some new faces might step forward to help with some or all of these.

I must also thank Councillor Peter Williams for the work he puts in for the Parish. Last, but not least, I must also thank our Clerk for her support to me, the parish council and indeed the parish over the last year.”

Our Parish Precept 2019/20

Two months ago, I went to a Parish Council meeting and asked why our precept for this year has risen by 26%. I was told that one of the reasons is because Cornwall Council has delegated to parish councils much of the work that it has done in the past, meaning that this work now has to be paid for from parish resources.

I then wrote to Cornwall Council, asking for an explanation. Our Parish Council has asked me to submit my letter and Cornwall Council's reply to Perran News for the information of all residents.

These letters appear below this brief introduction.

Dear Mr. Painter,

I am writing on behalf of a number of residents in Perranwell Station, who have expressed considerable concern that the precept for our parish for 2019/20 has gone up by 26% over the amount levied last year.

I raised this matter at a parish council meeting last week - in fact my precept has gone up by a total of 76% from the figure for 2015/6 - and I was informed that the reason for this is because parish councils are now expected to do so much more on behalf of parishes, as the County Council is no longer accepting responsibility for this work. The care of footpaths is one example given for the change of responsibility.

If the County Council is no longer doing work such as this, and thereby saving money, there would appear to be a strong case for Cornwall Council tax to be reduced or at least not increased. Otherwise there appears to be a clear case of double taxation, through the large increase in the parish precept.

If the County Council is not paying for the work to footpaths etc. to be done, it needs to cover the cost of this work, when arranged by parish councils.

I should be grateful to have your comments about this matter, so that I may relay them to the other concerned residents.

Thank you very much for your letter dated 2 April 2019 regarding Perranarworthal Parish Council and the increase in precept. Firstly, I am

very sorry that you are dissatisfied, but I appreciate the opportunity to respond to your concerns.

Since its creation, Cornwall Council like all other local authorities, has encountered unprecedented budget challenges due to austerity measures introduced by the Government and increased service pressures, in particular, around Adults and Children's Social Care. This has resulted in the Council having to make savings of around £350 million to date and a further £70 million of savings will be required over the next four years. These cuts have meant that as an authority it is just not possible to cover everything we used to do, as well as increasing the financial support to critical services like Adult and Children's Social Care.

The devolution of certain services to City, Town, Community and Parish Councils helps to sustain more locally-led service delivery, and in fact, preserve key functions which may otherwise not have been possible to continue to provide to the same extent, if at all.

Whilst Cornwall Council's Council Tax charge has increased by 3.99% in 2019/20, there is no element of double taxation as our Council Tax charge does not fund services that have been devolved to City, Town, Community and Parish Councils. This 3.99% increase is largely driven by the need to further increase the budget for critical social care.

Whilst we would be unable to comment on the precept raised by Perranarworthal, as this is a specific matter for the Parish Council, we recognise and celebrate the work done by local councils in supporting their local communities acknowledging that when taking on new services they *"may need to raise precepts to fund them."*

Whilst I appreciate this reply does not reduce the financial burden to you or your fellow residents, I do hope that I have clarified the point around double taxation.

I hope that you feel satisfied with the way we have handled your complaint. However, if you are not satisfied, you can ask for a review of the complaint by a senior officer.



DEFIBRILLATOR NEWS

During an incident on Sunday June 9th the ambulance service asked for the bus shelter machine to be picked up to assist a casualty in the village. The paramedics arrived with their own equipment before the village PAD was put into action. The Air Ambulance landed on the playing field also for this incident.

I am pleased to report the casualty was all right, and has now returned home. Very frightening for those concerned, but fortunately a storm in a teacup. It is very heartening that the emergency services can respond so quickly and comprehensively.

The defibrillator cabinets at the village hall, the bus stop and the cricket club all have their number locks disabled so can be opened by just turning the knob, and in the case of the bus shelter machine undoing the hasps at the side. **NO NUMBER COMBINATION IS REQUIRED TO OPEN THEM.** I check the batteries once a month and send a report to the ambulance service to confirm their serviceability. They are on the ambulance service map of available defibrillators to send people to whilst the paramedics are on their way.

The parish council has generously agreed to pay for new pads and batteries when they reach their expiry date, and the village hall pads were replaced in February.

Having the defibrillators in the village is a bit like paying for insurance. You hope you will never have to make a claim, but good to have if disaster strikes.





Sunny and Dry

Most of us like sunny and dry conditions, and in these respects May did not disappoint. Nationally too, the South West was the sunniest and driest region of the UK. Recorded rainfall at Perranwell Station was 1.06 inches, making it the driest May since 2010, with only 4 “rain days” (rainfall at least 0.04 inches). It was virtually dry from the 11th onwards. There were also plenty of sunny days to enjoy.

The temperatures at Perranwell Station were slightly above average, with the highest temperatures recorded towards the end of the month.

Looking at 2019 so far, average daily maximum temperatures have been 1C to 1.5C above the long term average, while rainfall overall has been close to average.

As I write this, June is turning out very differently to June last year. There will be a full report and comparison in Perran News.


From the Archive

July 2006 was, at the time, the warmest month on record over much of the UK and the sunniest over parts of England. There were numerous warm days associated with high pressure over northern Europe and a persistent southerly airstream over the UK. Over the period 16-19 July, the maximum temperature was between 32C and 35C over much of southern England, the Midlands and parts of Wales. The 36.5C recorded at Wisley, Surrey on the 19th was a record for July.

The heat placed strains on water and energy utilities, road and rail transport and the health and fire services. However, the hot, sunny weather also brought benefits to the tourist industry, food and drink retailers and, to some extent, farmers and growers.

As is usually the case with UK heatwaves, Cornwall avoided the highest temperatures. Here at Perranwell Station I recorded a maximum temperature for the month of 28C on the 17th.

The Perranwell Centre

As readers will know, the trustees of the Perranwell Centre have been conducting a survey of the Village Hall user groups. We are grateful to these groups for providing us with a lot of information. This will aid our discussions about what improvements can be made and about the future. The results of the survey are as follows, based on 24 replies received:

1. Who uses the Village Hall?

The 24 groups had 671 members
29% live in Perranwill Station
30% live within 3 miles
41% live more than 3 miles away

2. What do hirers like?

Main Hall – the size of the Hall and its sprung floor. parking
Meeting Rooms – light, airy and spacious rooms

parking accessibility and proximity
Users of the Main Hall tend to come from further away

Users of the Meeting Rooms tend to come from areas closer

3. What is unattractive

Heating, lighting and soundproofing. Unheated toilets. The furniture. The lack of storage. Dirt and odour. The oven and hob in the kitchen

4. Priorities for refurbishment highlighted by user groups

Better heating, better hall floor, better lighting, better acoustic insulation, better doors, especially for disabled access, better furniture, better toilets, more parking

5. Should the Village Hall be rebuilt?

2 respondents thought the hall was fine, 22 offered suggestions as follows:

Main Hall – big, high, sprung floor

Meeting rooms – big, light and airy with good access, better furniture, more storage, effective soundproofing, better facilities e.g. cloakroom, changing rooms, more parking

6. Is the kitchen satisfactory?

16 groups use the kitchen, 14 said 'yes', 2 said 'no'. Suggestions for improvement included a total update, a better cooker, a dishwasher and a reliable boiler.

7. Facilities for disabled people

The problems listed were as follows:

Too few disabled parking spaces, uneven surfaces outside cause problems, the main entrance and the internal doors cause problems, wheelchair access is not good.

Time walk around Perranwell on Thursday 6th June

On a pleasant summer evening, 54 villagers and others from the surrounding area enjoyed a leisurely stroll around Perranwell looking at points of interest. The walk was researched and lead by Ruth Ward and Carrie Langford of the local history group.

The walk was loosely based on a 1986 walk event which was probably led by the late Bob Acton.

Starting from the village hall, the route went up to the school, West Park, the church footpath, Station Road, Greenwith road, Tarrandean Lane and back to the Royal Oak in the village centre.

En route the group was given information on the older buildings such as the school, Village shop, old cottages & shops, the Chapel, Mellingey House, and the Old Toll House (now a Pottery).

There were stories about notable people from the Parish like Frederick Hamilton Davey, the Botanist, the Jose Family of Mellingey, and the village blacksmith, Jimmy Tiddy .

Other points of interest were the sites of mining activity at Perran Downs and Silver Hill, the railway history, and some legal disputes over air pollution and water rights plus a Bronze age Barrow.


In Mrs Dale's Diary of last month, she made encouraging mention of our "wildflower meadow", and we feel that we should further explain the shaggy appearance of our patch of roadside grass, when all around are neat and tidy lawns. No, not laziness (as has indeed been suggested!) but respect for the plants that we found growing among the grass, and for the bees, butterflies and other insects that might benefit.

It all started when, one Spring, we noticed a number of nodding white Lady's Smock lighting up the sward before a late first cut, so that particular patch of grass was left to grow. The flowers had hardly faded when buttercups and a few daisies started to make an appearance, and along with them (oh dear!) brilliant dandelions, and then a succession of common roadside flowers began to add colour and variety to our patch.

One year we even had enough colour to help to decorate the front cover of the Perranwell News! More recently we have been doing some judicious "cheating" by adding a few suitable plants such as Lent Lilies, Camassias and Meadow Cranesbill, and these are currently slowly establishing themselves.

Yes, it has indeed been helping to save the regular effort and energy of mowing. But each year that bonus comes to a sudden end when, towards the end of July/beginning of August most flowering plants have set seed and the grasses have taken over. Then, in order to try and gain some form of control over the situation, the whole lot must be cut. It is surprising how soon the resulting devastation greens up again until, hopefully, the whole story can begin again the following spring.

We had already purchased a small plant of *Ugni molinae* when we saw it mentioned in one of the programmes covering the Chelsea Flower Show. *Ugni* are a genus of fifteen evergreen shrubs that are natives of South America. They are all members of the myrtle family and have been listed under *Myrtaceae* before being given a genus of their own.

Ugni molinae is a slow-growing, small to medium sized shrub with leathery leaves. It has a rather stiff and erect growing habit, all the better to show off the nodding, waxy, pink bells, These are followed by delicious, wine-red berries. This shrub is variously called the Chilean cranberry or the Chilean guava.

At the time of purchase we did not know *Ugni molinae* was collected in Chile by William Lobb in 1844. The Lobb brothers hailed from Devon so even more reason to grow this shrub. It gained an Award of Merit in 1925. we are growing ours in a large pot at present placed in a sunny spot. i have used a good soil-based compost with added grit. As I write at the beginning of June the first flowers are opening, and with the help of the bees there will be some fruits perhaps in July. Fruiting can continue into October so the season is long. Water in very dry wether even if planted in the ground, and weekly if pot-grown.



In the courtyard are two citrus plants. They are now on their "Summer holidays" in a sheltered sunny place, after being in the greenhouse for the winter. These two evergreens are doing well. The leaves are green, and there are flowers on both plants, and lemons on the older of the two. They are both *Citrus Meyer*, formally known as *Citrus Meyer's Lemon*. This is thought to be a hybrid between *Citrus Limon*, the lemon and *Citrus Sinesis*, the sweet orange. Citrus originated in South-East Asia, but are now widely grown in warm temperate and sub-tropical regions of the world. They may be grown against sunny walls in very warm, sheltered gardens, but most are probably best given conservatory treatment. We have found that growing them outside from may until October, and then moving them under cover for the winter works well. In the unheated greenhouse we use fleece at night if the weather turns very cold. I feed weekly in summer with run water and weak tomato food, and in winter less often. I usually wait until the surface of the compost is dry, and then water well until water runs away from the base of the pot.

The deep green leaves are a lovely background to the flowers and fruits. the flowers are held in clusters. The buds are purple-pink, opening white and very fragrant. The large yellow fruits are freely produced, but may take a year to ripen, but well worth the wait. They are lovely to use in the kitchen, both zest and juice, as they have not been treated in any way. I use secateurs to cut them so as not to damage adjoining fruits.

Citrus Meyer was given an Award of Merit in 1982 (we were certainly selling it in the nursery then, and an Award of Garden Merit in 2002 . This is the variety to start with for home-grown lemons.

"When we reached them we forgot all of our troubles, so singular is the appearance of that called the Beautiful Island (Isola Bella). Imagine a quantity of arcade, with thirty-six terraces.... Each of these terraces is hung with palisades of jessamine, orange trees or pomegranits, with pots of flowers placed on the ledge."

POST BOX DEMISE?

“As from June 3rd 2019 collections from this Post box (near the top of Greenwith Hill, Perranwell Station), will be collected after 9.00 am on weekdays and after 7.00 am on Saturdays”. So said the notice on the box. No specific time! It is therefore presumed that the mail will be collected ‘some time’ during the day by the delivery postmen, whose delivery times fluctuate wildly from day to day, with no idea of when the collection has taken place. In future if you need to be certain of catching the collection you will need to have your mail in the box before the said earlier times. It does now tell you that a later collection is made at Perranwell Post Office, or Truro Sorting Office.

Admittedly it is some 59 years since I came to live on Silver Hill, but then there were two mail deliveries a day made to all properties, brought each day by the post-delivery lady (Yvonne Cook on bicycle) around 9.00 am, as well as in the afternoon. (Wish I could remember how much the postage was then, I suspect about 5d). The collection from the box was late afternoon – hence you could make a ‘by return of post claim’. A few years later it was decided that only houses built before WW2 would continue to have two deliveries, so my dwelling being new, ceased to receive afternoon post even though the post-lady would cycle passed the place!

Inevitably it was not long before all afternoon deliveries were stopped. Then a notice on the Post box in the 1970’s appeared stating that the afternoon collection would stop and become a morning one only. I challenged this as my then business was helped by being able to send mail ‘by return of post’. After personal contact to me from the PO Sorting Office Official this was accepted as important and our afternoon collections have continued until now.

So it does seem that our Mail service is in sharp decline, no doubt due mostly to the extensive use of email, but some items still need to go by the snail mail system, often important ones – so do I suspect that this new system is being created so the powers that be will soon deem it not viable at all and take away our box altogether, like the one on the road towards the Bissoe Flats? Yes, it will save the PO sending a van out each afternoon to collect from said box, but will it perhaps just drive past it en-route to Perranwell Post Office?

Such is History - with technology the culprit of a creeping demise for the rural community, even though we have new building developments, passed by the planning authorities, in the area almost adjoining the site of the box, such is progress – what a pity!

PS. This post box is also remembered for snails chewing at the gum on envelopes and the time when bored teenagers stuffed the box with the cuttings from the verges with no room left to post your letters (come to think of it – it is also rare for the verges to be cut at all so no fear of a stuffed box these days!)

Of Wires and Men

Our old Night storage fuse box had to be replaced by a safe modern consumer unit.

F J Kemp and Sons arrived promptly and set about a task that was problematic due to restricted access and old wires being not quite long enough. Suffice it to say that the work was completed efficiently and very neatly finished off with every piece of debris removed. The matter was concluded by receipt of a very fair invoice.

A READER WRITES



Cycling from three-wheeler to e-bike

When I was a kid my parents bought me a tricycle. I loved it. I could speed around the streets to my heart's content, often with a friend standing on the back. It was quite safe in those days, and I lived in a cul-de-sac of 15 houses on a new estate (there were 14 really as there was no number 13) and there was only 1 car in a whole street. June, who lived three doors down, was my 'partner in crime'. One time we found a deflated balloon. I blew it up and tied it to my handlebars. We were greeted with some strange looks from passers-by, some smiled, some shocked and others looked embarrassed. It wasn't until we got home that we found we were in trouble. The balloon disappeared very quickly and we were told never to do that again. Whatever had we done? It was many years before I realised the answer to that question.

For her birthday June was given a two wheeler. I was very envious. I wanted one too. "When you're ready for it" was the response from my parents. How could I show I that I was ready? One day I saw my chance. June went in for lunch and left her bike outside. I approached with excitement and trepidation. It wasn't actually stealing, was it? I climbed on and, although a little wobbly to begin, off I went. I shouted for my mother and she came to the door and saw me. I was told off for pinching the bike but it worked, a few weeks later I had my 2 wheeler.

Now that opened up a whole new world for me. It wasn't long before I was riding one-handed, then no hands, broadside skids, jumping up and down kerbs and as time went on it was games with all the other kids on the street. Bicycles football, hockey, obstacle courses, fast races, slow races and speedway. There became a series of bikes and configurations, according to the current game we were playing. Fix-wheel, wide handlebars, high saddle, low saddle, no saddle at all. We would fold a cigarette packet and push it between the forks and the brakes to make a whirring sound as the wheel went round clattering on the spokes.

Some of the older boys had drop-handlebar bikes with Derailleur gears and toe-clips. A Claud Butler was the envy of the serious cyclist. They belonged to a club and would go out on long rides up steep hills. It was all a bit formal and expensive for us younger ones.

I had to do with a Sun Manxman, drop-handlebars, 6 gears (Simplex) A welcome change from the old Sturmey Archer 3 speed hub gears. A small group of us decided to cycle the 40 miles to Southend. It was the most ambitious ride that I had attempted. To celebrate our arrival, we descended on the Kursaal. We spent far too much energy on the delights there, in that the trip back home was somewhat disorderly. It was every man for himself. I'm proud to say that I made it all the way, but had to spend the next day in bed. The others? Two phoned home for lifts, 1 hitched a lift on a lorry and none of us rode our bikes for quite a few days after that.

When I started work I would cycle the 6 miles there and back. One unpleasant day a car ran into me crumpling my back wheel and sent me flying. The driver stopped and asked me if I was OK and while I was counting my bruises he drove off. I didn't have the presence of mind to get his registration number, let alone his insurance details, but by then I was old enough to get a provisional licence, so I forgot the bike and bought a Douglas Vespa. So ended my cycling days.

Fast forward nearly half a century. I have moved to Cornwall, married, and have 2 daughters. Of course, they had to have bikes living near the cycle track, it was perfect for them to learn. It's played a large part in Tabitha's life ever since, joining Life Cycle UK, a Bike Courier in London, and even cycling half way round the world. (serialised in PN)

When I had my heart attack (another story) it was stressed that I needed to get lots of exercise, and whilst walking along the tramway Carrie had noticed posters advertising cycling for health, a 12-week course free of charge. We had seen the 'peddle back the years' group on several occasions and I was surprised when Carrie said "Let's go for it". I must point out at this stage that Carrie had had a deprived childhood and never learned to ride a bike. We got the bikes out, cleaned and oiled them up and gave them a try. Originally, the plan was to cycle to Bissoe, where it all took place, do the ride and then cycle back home. We soon realise that that would be a bit too much. So we ended up having to get a bike rack and put the bikes on the back of the car. Then it was helmets, padded trousers, tops, gloves, water

bottles and before we knew it we're on a spending spree. After a couple of weeks we were able to cycle down to Bissoe, do the ride & cycle home. Cycling up our lane was a bit of

a challenge though. We found the group very helpful and accommodating and it was fun. Carrie managed 10 yards before falling off but it was a gentle fall, no harm done. (we took it in turns to fall off) We were taught the skills of cycling, bike maintenance and all the dos and don'ts. It became quite a social event. So much so that we signed up for the next course,... and the next.

One time, when the girls were down we decided to do the Mineral Tramway to Portreath, an ambitious ride for us but with Tabitha and Hannah's company. it was do-able. I had never ridden a tandem I thought it a good opportunity to give it a try and would be easy on Carrie. So we hired one from Bissoe Bike Hire. A BIG mistake.... I couldn't get used to how long it was and the back-end, where Carrie was, kept bashing into gate-posts. She insisted on getting off every time we came within sight of a gate.

Lycra? Yes, we wear Lycra. I too used to join in the jokes about Lycra clad bodies, mainly because there was a bloke at one of the music festivals, fully clad in Lycra, who would dance his version of ballet for the whole festival. A friendly chap and became known as 'Lycra Man'. Turns out he was a GP... Do you know what your doctor gets up to in his spare time??? But Lycra is warm, easy to clean, and most comfortable.

As you can imagine the rides got longer and longer and one fine, sunny, Saturday morning the hills came thick and fast. Now I am up for a

challenge but I began to ask myself 'do I need this'? Supposed to be enjoying this but, by the time I got home that would be me, finished for the day. E-bikes seem to be getting more popular, and one,... then two of our riders acquired one. Frowned upon by us hardened cyclists, slowly the advantages became apparent, and when Carrie suggested that I should get one I seriously considered it. The price was a bit off-putting but the alternative didn't look good either. So I bought myself a Ghost, Landersol electric bike. Wow, what a difference that makes. I can travel farther, faster and get far less exhausted. You still have to work to keep the pedals turning. As long as there is pressure on the pedals you have power. First I used it in eco-mode for most hills and switched off on the flat and down hill. It soon came to me that, having paid for it, I should get my moneys worth, so I tend to use the power more frequently. I have four options, eco, tour, sport, turbo and, of course, off. In turbo the most daunting hill is no problem at all. An electric bike flattens all the hills in Cornwall. It was a while before Carrie went through the same experience, but she too has an electric bike now, as do many others.

Now that 'Saddle up Saturdays' is part of One & All Cycling, we ride Saturday mornings, from Stithians Lake Water Sports Centre, Elm Farm Bike Hire at Cambrose, The Croust Hut at King Edward Mine, Miss Molly's Tea Rooms and The Methodist Chapel at Twelvheads. A small group ride on a Monday morning from Bissoe and there is a separate group, run by a couple who ride a tandem. They organise rides further afield, Plymouth to Tavistock, Exeter to Exmouth, Exeter to Dawlish, The Tarka Trail, and soon we're off to The New Forest. Fancy joining us?




