

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT: JUNE 2023

The planning committee met on 7 June, followed by an extraordinary meeting of the parish council to discuss interim clerking arrangements and begin the process of recruiting a new clerk and assistant clerk. Cllr A Bridges was appointed by the council to act as the interim clerk.



The new **Environment Working Group** held its inaugural meeting on 13 June, beginning with a wideranging discussion on the potential role of the group. It was agreed that there is a need to start identifying areas where there are opportunities for improvement to enhance our environment, create new habitats and preserve existing ones. The next meeting of the group, which is open to all parishioners, would be held on Tuesday 8 August.

A meeting of **the Staffing Committee** was held on 14 June to agree all the documentation for applicants for the vacant clerk and assistant clerk positions. The closing date for applications was set at 17 July.

The full parish council met on 28 June. Members of the public raised issues in relation to cutting grass in one area of the village and not cutting grass in another, illustrating the difficulty of pleasing all the people all the time. However, the council agreed to do its best to meet these various requests.

The council considered two Decision Notices issued by Cornwall Council in relation to two recent complaints against the chairman. One of the Notices found that a breach of the Code of Conduct had occurred and required the council to adopt recommendations to censure the chairman and seek an apology. However, the council declined to adopt either recommendation. When the chairman returned to the meeting, he announced that prior to the meeting he had discussed the findings with the monitoring officer, had accepted the criticism and therefore offered an apology.

Our ward councillor, Cllr Williams, had obtained quotes for an additional speed monitor in the parish. It was agreed that the presence of speed monitors had had a beneficial effect on the speed of traffic and the council agreed to purchase the extra monitor at a cost of £2,672 plus Vat (although Vat will be reclaimed).

It was a matter of some concern that the statutory Annual Governance & Accounting Return had not been correctly completed on time and that an extension had now to be sought from the external auditor for both an extension for the submission of the accounts and the period allowed for public inspection. Regrettably, this would inevitably result in a qualified audit opinion.

A grant application from the Parochial Church Council was deferred for further clarification, and a proposal that the parish council should become responsible for the maintenance of the defibrillators in the parish was also deferred for the same reason.

The council adopted a Safeguarding Statement and agreed to appoint a Safeguarding Officer.

Fallen trees are becoming a regular hazard in the parish. It has become clear that Cormac has largely withdrawn from the business of removing fallen trees, even those that fall on a highway, and it will increasingly become the responsibility of the parish council to deal with these. The cost of removing a fallen tree can be substantial (several hundred pounds each) and the parish council will need in future to ensure it has sufficient funds to cover this work.

Councillors continue to represent the parish on the Community Area Partnership (formerly the Community Network) and the Maritime Line Forum, and Mr Stuart Douglas is also thanked for his keen interest.

Of course, the key news for the parish during this month was the announcement of the imminent closure of the Perranwell Stores. The parish council had played a key role in helping to galvanise the community, not least by agreeing to fund the activities of the informal group attempting to find alternatives. ClIrs C Bridges and A Bridges were authorized to act as the parish council's representatives on this work. The council was pleased to appoint and welcome three new councillors: ClIrs Lea Thomas, Darren Ring and Dave Ward. Their contact details will appear elsewhere in Perran News.

The new play equipment, funded by a grant from the Community Infrastructure Levy, has been installed and is being enjoyed by many children. A formal opening ceremony will have been held on 20 July.

During this period, discussions had continued with the football club about the levelling of the football pitch. In the previous issue of Perran News, a contributor wrote that "It would certainly have been a relief to parishioners struggling with household budgets to read that should the proposed groundworks be approved they will be funded from an external source and not be a financial burden on the Parish or the Parish Precept." Perhaps readers will recall that the purpose of the playing field charity, of which the parish council is the sole trustee, is to provide a recreation ground for everybody, including facilities for sport, recreation and play. The levelling of the pitch would benefit others besides the football club, especially the school, and hopefully would be accompanied by other improvements that will be advantageous for everybody in the community. Under those circumstances, perhaps it would be only right and proper not to leave the entire cost to the football club.

As usual, parishioners are encouraged to attend meetings of the council, its committees (except the staffing committee, whose business is confidential) and the various working groups. Very Warm, Sunny and predominantly Dry

June 2023 was similar to the last two Junes, but even warmer! After the first week, temperatures routinely reached the low to mid twenties, making it the warmest June that I have recorded in 37 years, 2C-3C above the Perranwell long-term average. Nationally, it was the warmest June in the series from 1884.

It was also a sunny month, nationally the 4th sunniest in the series from 1910, and the sunniest June since 1957.

Rainfall was below the June average by some 23%, which somewhat underplays how dry it actually was for most of the month. Over half the month's rainfall fell on the 20th (1.14 inches).

Warmer Waters?

The West Briton recently reported that sea temperatures in Cornwall "are currently at unprecedented levels for June". According to the website <u>www.SeaTemperature.info</u>, Cornwall seas in June were reported as being between 17.1C and 17.2C, with the warmest places to swim being Fowey, Gorran Haven and Polkerris.

As it happens, I swam in the sea at Mousehole in June, and the water was certainly warmer than I was expecting, more like the end of August in my experience.

A glance at the website's temperature figures shows that the sea around Cornwall in June 2023 was a degree or so above the June average for the previous ten years, during which temperature fluctuations were relatively small.

Looking further afield, according to the website <u>https://argo.ucsd.edu</u> (Argo and Climate Change), more than 90% of the excess heat absorbed by the Earth since the 1970s is stored in the oceans. This makes the oceans the ideal place to identify any long-term warming (or cooling) trends in our climate system. Argo floats have recorded temperatures in the upper half of the oceans since 2004. These floats cover the oceans down to a depth of 2000 metres, an area said to capture roughly 90% of the change in ocean heat content of the the last two decades.

Globally, between 2004 and 2020, the upper 1900 metres of the oceans experienced a net warming of 0.07C, with the uppermost 100 metres warming by 0.2C. However, these average figures hide a range of data for different latitudes, regions and depths. In our own latitudes, i.e. the northern oceans from 55 to 65 degrees North, there has been a marked cooling down to 1400 metres depth, by as much as 0.3C at 350 metres, and a slight warming below 1400 metres.

So maybe Cornwall's higher sea temperatures this June were an anomaly after all. *Mike Hands mdh51@btinternet.com*

UPDATE ON THE SETTING UP OF A COMMUNITY SHOP

At the time of reading this the existing shop and post office will have closed.

Following the well-attended public meeting, volunteers put their names forward and a Scoping Committee was quickly formed. The sole objective of this committee was to look at various options for the setting up of a community shop and post office. After three meetings and a lot of hard work behind the scenes, this committee unanimously agreed on a Three Phase Transition plan. A management committee has now been created to deliver that plan.

Phase One: to be completed by the end of September 2023

A limited company, called the *Perranwell Community Store*, has been registered as the legal entity for trading purposes. It will be converted to a Community Benefit Society or Community Interest Company under phase two.

A temporary community store will be set up in the car park of the village hall using either a shipping container or portacabin located next to the football clubhouse. Volunteers with trade skills, e.g., electricians, painters & decorators, shop fitters, etc., will be asked to help fit it out.

Initial funding for set-up costs and stock purchases will be sought from the Parish Council, the Cornwall Council ward councillor and crowdfunding.

It has not been possible to secure a Post Office outreach service, even on a temporary basis, but approval will be sought for a locally funded PO branch. Thanks to the co-operation of the football club, post office services, if approved by the Post Office Limited, will be based in the football clubhouse, plus a coffee bar. Volunteers will be invited to staff the store and coffee shop.

Special thanks to Tim and Lizzie at the Royal Oak who have agreed that the pub will temporarily take over the prescription collection service from the existing shop on the 1st of August. Collection times will be strictly 11.00am to 12.00am and 15.00pm to 18.00pm Monday to Friday. Any queries must be relayed to Penryn Surgery, <u>not</u> the pub staff. The prescription collection service will relocate to the new community store once it is open.

Phase Two: targeted to be completed by the end December 2023

The limited company, Perranwell Community Store, will be converted into a Community Benefit Society or Community Interest Company.

The new company will offer shares to members of the community who wish to support the project. Applications will be made for additional funding through grants. Typically, grants aim to match funds raised by the community.

<u>Phase Three</u>: targeted to complete by the end of March 2024

The existing shop may be purchased by a local consortium/independent individual or by the community (subject to fund raising and usual market requirements).

Perranwell Community Store to relocate from its temporary site if the existing shop is purchased by the community. Alternatively look at options to rent retail space in the existing shop if commercially viable and offered as an option to the community.

How can you help?

1.If you completed a survey and indicated that you are willing to offer your services, we have your details and will be in contact with you. However, there were many people who stated they wished to help but didn't record their contact details on the survey form. We need you to get in touch. There will also be many more people who haven't received the survey, as they were unable to attend the public meeting, but would like to offer their support. The skills needed are fundraising (particularly crowd funding), shop volunteers and anyone with direct retail management experience. Do please come forward.

2. We need a portacabin or container. If you think you may have one to sell or donate, please get in touch as soon as possible.

3. If you are a skilled tradesperson, able to help in setting up the temporary facility, please contact us.


A reader has sent in this program for Heyday 1977, 46 years ago. I hope you will be interested to see what was a big annual event in the seventies.

PERRANARWORTHAL WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

At our June Meeting Laurie Stephenson came to talk to us about the work of the Flicka Foundation Donkey Sanctuary based up at Mabe Burnthouse. It was fascinating to hear the amazing work the sanctuary staff do to save and care for over 100 mules and donkeys. It was so sad to hear about the levels of abandonment, neglect and cruelty that many of the animals had suffered before being rescued. We learnt about how sociable donkeys can be and about the amount of care and sheer hard work needed to keep the animals happy and healthy. It was clear it takes an enormous amount of fundraising to keep the place running. Volunteers, as well as money raised from visitors, play a very important part in the upkeep of the sanctuary.

Jim Jeffries came along to talk to us at our July meeting. Jim is a volunteer with the National Coastwatch Institute and helps to run the St. Agnes station. He explained that the charity has 60 stations across the UK (although not in Scotland). The Institute is answerable to the Coastguard Service and was set up in 1994 after an incident at Cadgwith Cove. Withdrawal of government funding for the Coastguard Service made this an invaluable step. Jim explained that anyone can be a volunteer and people come from all walks of life to man the stations. As well as logging vessels and reporting incidents at sea, they also watch over the coastpath and broadcast weather forecasts to vessels if they've missed the coastguard's messages.

DARWIN'S DRIVE?

The road that linked the ports of Penryn and Falmouth to London, passing though Truro, Plymouth and Exeter in the Westcountry, was one of the country's most important historic transport and communications links during the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries.

The first leg of the route, from Falmouth to Truro was improved in 1754 by the creation of a turnpike – a pay-to-go road with a hard surface - and it should be no surprise that the route passed through the centre of the parish of Perranarworthal.

We are all by now familiar with the story of the Trafalgar Way, and the rush to get the news of Nelson's victory and death at Trafalgar up to the Admiralty in London - Lt Lapenotière's speedy ride along the coaching road through Perranwell on Nov 4th 1805 is commemorated with a plaque on the wall of the Royal Oak. It is however interesting to ponder on how many other momentous journeys passed this way, and what exciting news was carried of important people and events or world-changing discoveries and developments.

Recently, I came across a reference* to HMS Beagle's arrival in Falmouth harbour on the 2nd of October, 1836, at the end of a momentous 5-year voyage circumnavigating the world. This was of course, the famous 'Voyage of the Beagle' which took Charles Darwin to the Galapagos Islands, and ultimately resulted in the publication of his *Origin of Species*, and the unleashing of the concept of evolution by natural selection. Never a good sailor even after almost 5 years at sea, Darwin seized the chance to travel overland to Shrewsbury to visit his family; he caught the first available mail coach and headed home, leaving Captain Fitzroy to sail their ship on to London via Plymouth.

Darwin's coach, however, would have followed a different route to the one taken by Lapenotière in 1805. The course of the turnpike had been altered, in 1828, to avoid the steep hills into and out of Perranwell village (Cove Hill and Station Hill). A new road had been constructed along the valley bottom beside the Kennal River, through Perran Wharf and past the Norway Inn, which served as the coaching inn. It crossed the Carnon river by a causeway and a new bridge and this is the route which the A39 still follows today. Although there is no evidence that Darwin's coach stopped at Perran Wharf, it's not unlikely. If Nelson's messenger merits a plaque on the pub in Perranwell, why not a plaque for Darwin himself on the wall of the Norway Inn on Perran Wharf?

In terms of historical significance, the concept of evolution by natural selection initiated a scientific revolution which fundamentally transformed the biological sciences, but also confronted our philosophical and moral conceptions of what it means to be a human. Charles Darwin is universally acknowledged as one of the most important and influential figures in **human history**.

<u>News</u>

There was an unexpected change to the meeting on June 20th when our speaker Tasha Fullbrook, who was due to give a talk on her role as Cornwall Finds Liaison Officer had to cancel at the last minute due to illness. Our Secretary, Ruth Ward managed to find a talk she had done some years ago for pupils at Truro School on the History of the Portreath to Devoran cycleway, and quickly made some changes to make it more relevant to adults.



She spoke about the reasons for the original tramway being built and the choice of route, delving into the mining history of the area. The tramway began in 1815 to ship minerals, mainly tin and copper from the mines inland to the port of Portreath for transport, particularly to S Wales where some of the ore was smelted. The ships were loaded with coal for the return journey as this was needed to power the steam engines. They were originally waggon-ways using horses, but small steam locomotives were introduced in 1854 and it became the Redruth and Chacewater Railway linking up to other tramways and connecting through to Devoran.

The route has evidence both on maps and in the field of the many landscape changes caused by mining and the buildings associated with the processing/dressing of the minerals including the stamping mills and the iconic engine houses which contained the steam engines used for draining the mines. There is evidence of the once extensive docks at both Portreath and Devoran and many of the place names reflect the mining history. Accidents were frequent, such as breaking limbs through falls, or due to explosives being used; the invention of the safety fuse by William Bickford in 1831 greatly cut fatalities, but mines also suffered from flooding and miners drowned. There was a railway accident in 1899 where the tramway crossed Old Carnon Hill and steam locomotive Spitfire de-railed killing the brakesman. The decline of mining in Cornwall from the 1870s eventually caused the decline of the ports and the tramways that served them and eventually the disused route became the Devoran to Portreath cycleway.

We are pleased to hear that Tasha is now recovering well and she has offered to do her talk on Jan 16th 2024 so we hope that anyone who was hoping to bring along their own "finds" for Tasha to inspect will join us then.

"You've no idea" she hollered. The men watched her breathe heavily. Tanya headed home. Day was coming.



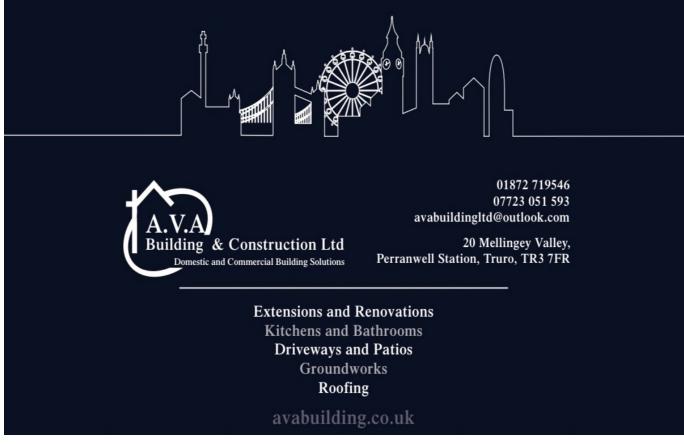


