

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The Parish Council has still been unable to physically meet because of the Covid19 pandemic. Virtual meetings have been held for both the main council meeting, and also planning. There is no indication at present when normal meetings might resume.



The Council has resolved to continue supporting a food swap for the Parish during this pandemic and thank the organisers for their ongoing commitment. The Council has also taken over the cleaning of the bus shelter down at the layby near the fruit and veg stall and arranged for rubbish bins to be regularly emptied.

People will have seen the plans for a new village hall outlined by the Chairman of the hall trustees. The Parish Council, in its role as trustee of the Playing Field, will be meeting with the village hall trustees to discuss those proposals and its potential effect on the playing field. A report of that meeting will feature in a future edition of the *Perran News*. Any recommendations for permanent alteration of the playing field would need to be the subject of a full consultation with the parish, and also Fields in Trust as the governing body.

There is no council meeting in December, the next meeting of the Parish Council will be at the end of January 2021, either virtually or in person. There will be planning meetings in December and January, please contact the Clerk for details if you wish to attend.

If there are any matters that you would like raised, please either contact the Clerk or any Parish Councillor who will be pleased to help.

Wet and Dull

There was a brief bright and dry period from the 14th to the 18th, apart from which October was wet and relatively dull. Rainfall was well above normal for the month, with 25 "rain days" (days in which at least 0.04 inches of rain fell). Nationally, the unsettled weather following Storm Alex brought enough rain on the 3rd to make it the wettest day on record (in a series back to 1891) for UK-averaged rainfall (31.7mm). Unbelievably, the rain across the UK on that day would have been more than enough to fill Loch Ness.

There was an absence of warm days, reflected in the average daily maximum temperature of 13.9C, some 0.6C below the long-term average.

Update

November up to around mid-month has been mild, with rainfall well up to average. Although April, May and July were dry, rainfall for the whole of 2020 will probably be up towards 50 inches, on the wet side but not as wet as 2019.





THANK YOU FROM PERRAN-AR-WORTHAL SCHOOL!

March 23rd 2020 was the start of a challenging few months for schools where the need to offer the best possible education for our future adults was interrupted by the lockdown. With the reopening of schools to all pupils at the beginning of this academic year, all school leaders were desperately trying to review the use of their buildings to ensure they had made every effort to mitigate the risk of the virus spreading. A troubling time for us all! However, Perran-ar-Worthal is a school embedded in the hands of a caring and supportive community and when we were presented with the generous offer of the use of the village hall by the trustees, this made everything more possible and bearable for our pupils and staff. How you may ask...?

The village hall, being much larger than our school hall, has enabled our staff to carry out indoor PE lessons with greater social distancing between pupils. This in turn has allowed us to use our own school hall for a class of pupils where a member of our teaching staff, who suffers with asthma, has been able to more safely return to teach in a larger space. The further positive knock-on effect from this has meant that we have been able to disperse our 6 classes of pupils across seven teaching rooms enabling pupils to be taught in smaller class groups where they now have more space in their classroom to safely sit further apart. And of course, the option of additional storage space has been another huge advantage this has allowed the staff to remove large items of furniture and sports equipment to create even more space within our classrooms to help mitigate risk.

Perran-ar-Worthal School would like to publicly thank the village hall trustees for their kind consideration of the needs of the children in our community. Having being offered the use of the village hall prior to the start of this academic year gave us the time to review the available teaching space within our school building to ensure we were able to offer a safer teaching and learning environment for our pupils and staff under the COVID restrictions and government guidelines. This additional space has provided us with some sense of normality in the current climate. Thank you to all involved in helping to keep our community as safe as possible. Every day that we continue to remain open as a school is a bonus and we hope that soon we can celebrate the joy of bringing our whole community back together once more.

AN EXCITING DEVELOPMENT!

In response to the exciting new developments planned for the Perranwell Centre, the school is impressed with the possibilities this change will provide to the Perranwell Community as well as the pupils of Perranwell-ar-Worthal School. Over the years, the school has become a regular user of the village hall for concerts, plays, fund raising events and, of course currently, our PE lessons as part of our statutory curriculum delivery. The proposed plans will clearly offer all ages of the community an

excellent base for life-long learning, social enjoyment and much more. As the school continues to grow, with a current number on roll of 163 pupils, we wondered what capacity the auditorium will hold, what parking will be available to families arriving at school during the busy time of day and, having experienced the occasional dangerous encounter of walking groups of children through the main gate, whether there are any plans to create a pedestrian entrance to ensure safer access for members of the community visiting the Perranwell centre on foot?

We very much look forward to seeing how Perranwell will continue to flourish with so many exciting developments afoot.

ON THE PLAYING FIELD - PART 2

You'll remember that last month I responded to an article in the October edition of Perran News by 'Fund Raising Friends of KGV Playing Field' which attempted to explain the purpose of the playing field and the role of the parish council as the playing field charity's sole trustee. I believed that some comments were either inaccurate or misleading and offered some clarification.

Part 1 looked at the history behind the involvement of Fields in Trust, the definition of an outdoor playing space, the sorts of facilities that could be provided on such a space and the means by which improvements could come about. This month the focus is on car parking.

The original article by the Fund Raising Friends offered an opinion on "whether more parking could be made available by using playing field land." The answer was that "This is not an option." Unfortunately, this is historically and technically inaccurate. As mentioned in Part 1, Fields in Trust expects playing field trustees to improve facilities, which includes car parking, for the obvious reason that it's important to ensure that people can access playing fields.

Again, let's start with a little bit of history. When the playing field gateway was constructed following receipt of the grant in 1949, it did not seem to lead to a car park area on the playing field; one suspects that its width was designed primarily to accommodate a tractor pulling a lawn mower. Old photos show that when the first village hall was built in 1953 (a secondhand ex-World War II Nissen hut), a driveway was constructed that curved from the gateway to a parking area in front of the village hall (remember: there were far fewer cars in those days). When the village hall was re-built in 1971, again, a tarmac driveway curved round in front of the village hall (see the photo below). There still did not seem to be a dedicated car park for the playing field. Therefore, for the first 20 years of its existence, the playing field itself seemed to have no designated car parking of its own, and for approximately the next 40 years, users of the playing field seemed to use the village hall car park.

The article claimed that "The playing field has 20 parking spaces which are more than adequate for its own use and all are welcome to use them." (Actually, there are 19 spaces adjacent to the field, but I'm happy to stick with round numbers). Clearly, those spaces were not part of the original playing field. So when were they created and how did that come about? They seem to have been created around 1991 by digging up a strip of the grassed area, which was probably done at the same time as the present football clubhouse was built. Clearly, it was an option at that time, and illustrates that change can, in fact, be achieved when it is so desired. Incidentally, I have not



discovered whether Fields in Trust were consulted about this. (Perhaps the Friends would like to clarify this point. Of course, if Fields in Trust or its predecessor were consulted and had approved the change, it would rather undermine the suggestion that change is not an option and that Fields in Trust is intransigent).

Moreover, was it ever established that those spaces were specifically designated for users of the playing field? If it ever was, it's a demarcation that has long since ceased to exist in practice. It is true that the parish council, at the request of the village hall trustees, now contributes to the cost of maintenance of those car parking spaces on playing field land, because it would be improper for the village hall trustees to pay for the upkeep of another charity's assets. However, and very sensibly, the whole car park is currently available for users of either the village hall or playing field. Sometimes, all the spaces are taken by users of the playing field; at other times, it is users of village hall. The car park is also well used by parents bringing children to and from school. This is a good example of a shared facility that works for the benefit of all.

However, occasions do arise when there is considerable pressure on the current car park capacity. The photo below illustrates the problem. Despite the claim that 20 spaces 'are more than adequate' for playing field users, this photo shows that that is not the case. It was taken one Saturday afternoon and shows the vehicles of footballers and supporters of both teams, who were, of course, all legitimate users of the playing field. This was not an isolated instance; it happens frequently. Now, it's not suggested that the car park should ever be large enough to accommodate every possible user of the field or hall, but the claim is challenged that 20 spaces 'are more than adequate'.

The original article appeared to criticise village hall trustees and other groups who have sought improvements (declaration of interest: I am the chair of the village hall trustees, although this item has been written in a personal capacity). It said, "Being charitable land it is not within the Trustees gift to give away any part of the playing field to other groups/clubs/organisations simply for their benefit to ease their own parking issues. That would be akin to your next-door neighbour demanding you give them your garden to park their car!"



Nobody has ever asked for this; it was naughty to suggest that playing field trustees had been asked to 'give away' land. The issue has always been about how best to manage those occasions when the number of vehicles belonging to users of the playing field or the village hall or both exceeds the capacity of the car park. The debate has always been about how to make the best use of resources for the mutual benefit of everybody. These are problems that are best tackled together. Other groups and organisations have sought — and continue to seek — cooperation from the parish council in order to make improvements. Such discussions would be helped, I think, by a clearer understanding of roles, responsibilities and rules.

The Parish Council is busy applying for several grants to go towards our COVID response and so far we have been using some of the money to replenish the flood swop. We are open to any suggestions of using the money for other purposes so if you have any ideas, please could you contact Louisa.

NATIONAL RESTRICTIONS FROM 5TH NOVEMBER

Applies to: England (see guidance for Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland)

COVID-19 case numbers are rising rapidly across the whole of the UK and in other countries. We must act now to control the spread of the virus. The single most important action we can all take to fight coronavirus is to stay at home, to protect the NHS and save lives.

When we reduce our day-to-day contact with other people, we reduce the spread of the infection. That is why, from Thursday 5 November until Wednesday 2 December, you must:

- Stay at home, except for specific purposes.
- Avoid meeting people you do not live with, except for specific purposes.
- Close certain businesses and venues.

These new measures will reduce the growth rate of the virus, which will:

- prevent the NHS from being overwhelmed
- ensure schools, colleges and universities can stay open
- ensure that as many people as possible can continue to work

On Thursday 5 November these national restrictions replaced the Local Covid Alert Level measures.

The new measures will apply nationally for four weeks up to and including Wednesday 2 December. At the end of that period, we will return to a regional approach, based on the latest data.

These measures will be underpinned by \underline{law} . Police and other authorities will have powers to give fines and break up gatherings.

You can help to protect your friends and family by downloading the $\underline{\text{NHS COVID-19 App}}$ to keep updated on the latest guidance from Thursday 5 November

There is separate guidance for households with a possible or confirmed coronavirus infection.

1. Stay at home

You must not leave or be outside of your home unless where permitted by law. This may include:

Work and volunteering

You can leave home for work purposes, or to provide voluntary or charitable services, where you cannot do this from home.

Essential activities

You can leave home to buy things at shops which are permitted to open. For instance to buy food or medicine, or to collect any items - including food or drink - ordered through click-and-collect or as a

takeaway, to obtain or deposit money (e.g. from a bank or post office), or to access critical public services (see section below).

Fulfilling legal obligations

You may also leave home to fulfil legal obligations.

Moving home

You may leave home to carry out activities related to buying, selling, letting or renting a residential property.

• Education and childcare

You can leave home for education (formal provision, rather than extracurricular classes such as music or drama tuition, or driving lessons) or training. You can also leave home for the purposes of registered childcare and supervised activities for children that are necessary to allow parents/carers to work, seek work, or undertake education or training. Parents can still take their children to school, and people can continue existing arrangements for contact between parents and children where they live apart.

Meeting others and care

You can leave home to visit people in your <u>support bubble</u>, or to provide informal childcare for children aged 13 and under as part of a <u>childcare bubble</u>, to provide care for vulnerable people, to provide emergency assistance, attend a support group (of up to 15 people), or for respite care where that care is being provided to a vulnerable person or a person with a disability, or is a short break in respect of a looked after child. People can also exercise outdoors or visit an outdoor public place (see section 3).

Medical reasons, harm and compassionate visits

You can leave home for any medical reason, including to get a COVID-19 test, for medical appointments and emergencies, to be with someone who is giving birth, to avoid injury or illness or to escape risk of harm (such as domestic abuse), or for animal welfare reasons – e.g. to attend veterinary services for advice or treatment.

You can also leave home to visit someone who is dying or someone in a care home (if permitted under care home guidance), hospice, or hospital, or to accompany them to a medical appointment.

Events

You can leave home to attend a place of worship for individual prayer, a funeral or a related event for someone who has died, to visit a burial ground or a remembrance garden, or to attend a deathbed wedding. A list of what constitutes a 'reasonable excuse' for leaving home can be found in the <u>regulations</u>.

2. Meeting others safely

In general, you must not meet with another person socially or undertake any activities with another person. However, you can exercise or meet in a public, outdoors space with people you live with, your <u>support bubble</u> (or as part of a <u>childcare bubble</u>), or with one other person.

You should minimise time spent outside your home. When around other people, stay 2 metres apart from anyone not in your household - meaning the people you live with - or your support bubble. Where this is not possible, stay 1 metre apart with extra precautions (e.g. wearing a <u>face covering</u>).

You must not meet socially indoors with family or friends unless they are part of your household or support bubble.

A <u>support bubble</u> is where a household with one adult joins with another household. Households in that support bubble can still visit each other, stay overnight in each other's households, and visit outdoor public places together.

You can exercise or visit a public outdoor space:

- by yourself
- with the people you live with
- with your support bubble
- or, when on your own, 1 person from another household

- Children under 5, and up to two carers for a person with a disability who needs continuous care, are **not** counted towards the outdoors gatherings limit.
- There is further guidance on what exercise and other physical activity can continue during the period of national restrictions.

Public outdoor places include:

- neighbourhood streets, parks, beaches, and the countryside
- public gardens and grounds (whether or not you pay to enter them)
- allotments
- outdoor playgrounds
- You cannot meet people in a private garden, unless you live with them or have formed a support bubble with them.
- <u>Face coverings</u> are required by law to be worn in many indoor settings, such as shops or places of worship where these remain open, and on public transport.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

The whole of Perran Ar Worthal Parish – ie 757 properties is now a part of Devon and Cornwall Police Neighbourhood Watch Scheme.

Updates from the Police on how to protect your property and how to report suspicious activity will be provided via the Emergency Plan's Facebook Page https://www.facebook.com/Perran-ar-Worthal-Emergency-Plan-106919330840682 so please do like the page so you can keep abreast of what is happening within the Parish.



The benefits of Neighbourhood Watch schemes are:

- Increase surveillance
- Alter offenders' perception of risk, if an area is clearly marked as a Neighbourhood Watch area
- Alter the behaviour of residents, by encouraging them to consciously consider their own home security measures, and
- Encourage other forms of social interaction and neighbourhood cohesion among communities.
- Access to a range of ready-made <u>campaigns</u> and <u>toolkits</u>: <u>burglary, domestic abuse</u>, <u>serious violence</u> and <u>child sex exploitation</u>.
- **Crime prevention advice** such as <u>vehicle crime</u>, <u>elder abuse</u>, <u>disability hate crime</u>, and advice on <u>access to CCTV</u>.
- Tackling important issues that affect our communities such as <u>Youth Isolation</u>; <u>Loneliness and Vulnerability</u>
- Sharing local information and events

We are able to put up Neighbourhood Watch road signs and if you would like one for your road then please let Louisa know so that we can pass this on to the Parish Council for approval.

FLOOD RISK

We are working very closely with Cornwall Council and other Statutory Authorities and Perran Ar Worthal Emergency Plan has been picked to undertake a case study for assessing how a community responds to flood risk all part of the Governments drive for community preparedness. This is fantastic news.

Those of you would have noticed that the Trewedna Stream is a minor river and therefore has no flood alerts or warnings. These are only issued on rivers which are managed by the Environment Agency. As part of the Emergency Plan assessment, we identified early on that an early warning flood system is vital to be able to inform any flood warning and evacuation plan for the village. We asked the Parish Council and they purchased a Metos Water Probe and rainfall gauge — installed free of charge by Premier Water Solutions 10 Ltd. It works by measuring the water depth and when this rises to a predetermined level the alarm issues Louisa with a text flood warning. This will then enable her - the Emergency Coordinator to initiate the Emergency Plan safely via the flood wardens. We had to get permission from Cornwall Highways to install the equipment as the bridge is grade 1 listed.

These photos show the final installation of the probe.








Why are we doing this?

Our climate in the UK is changing. We have had the wettest February month in 2020 since records began. In some parts of the north of the country they had 400% more rain than the 1981-2010 rainfall average see the blue photo. In our region we only?! had 150% more rain than the average but in any year our catchment and our village could experience a freak event such as Coverack or Boscastle or be subjected to long prolonged rainfall over the winter months. Either way the risk of the Trewedna Stream flooding is likely to increase.

What information can we get from the sensors?








The sensors link to the field climate app and provides data like this:

And then we are able to see the rivers response to rainfall and assess the risk of flooding from the stream in real time. Examples are shown in the next pictures.



As part of our enthusiasm and approach to flood risk we have been selected to undertake a case study on our village – the first in the country so it really is a fantastic opportunity. It means that what we learn from our village will be potentially rolled out across the UK. We will be placed firmly on the map and be known as an innovative and a forward-thinking community.

Here is a piece about the case study:

<u>Perranwell Station Property Flood Resilience Case Study – Nov 2020</u>

Whilst engineered flood defences, flood warnings, upper catchment measures and a wide range of other flood risk management interventions are making real improvements to the number of household and businesses impacted by record flood events, there is an increasing need for resilience to be built into individual properties through the installation of property flood resilience (PFR).

PFR is a means of minimising damage by preventing or reducing the amount of water that enters a property in a flood event and improving the recoverability of the property, thereby reducing the impact and the costs.

As part of the DEFRA Cornwall Pathfinder project, a case study will focus on the parish of Perranwell Station, with initial focus on two commercial properties and 10 domestic properties.

The case study will bring together several key stakeholders including Cornwall Council, DEFRA, Environment Agency and the Cornwall Flood Forum as well as industry specialists, Watertight, Previsico, Premier Water Solutions 10 Ltd and Perran ar worthal Emergency Plan.

The scope of the case study is to compliment the wider community flood plan and will produce evidence that early warning flood alerts coupled with property flood resilience (PFR) and robust flood plans can reduce risk to properties. This will hopefully allow insurers to offer affordable insurance for those at risk. All of this evidence is to be captured via a Flood Compliance Platform being developed by some of the stakeholders.

An initial property owner survey will be carried out to determine risk appetite and current levels of PFR, whilst also identifying any issues relating to access to flood insurance. This will be followed by a flood risk survey and specification for PFR measures.

The Perranwell case study will also be a trial site for a bespoke early warning flood alert system with flood sensors placed at the bridge running across the river. This is in addition to the one that we currently have in situ. This flood alert system should assist the Emergency Flood Plan for the Perranwell community co-ordinated by Louisa Inch.

A bit about the Cornwall Council Pathfinder project :

SW Property Flood Resilience (PFR) Pathfinder project – lead by Cornwall Council

One of the Environment Agency's key flood risk management objectives is to increase the awareness and take-up of more effective approaches to preparing for a flood and to protecting properties from flooding. To do this, DEFRA has provided funding of £2.9m for three Property Flood Resilience (PFR) Pathfinder projects across the country. Cornwall Council is leading one of these three projects on behalf of the five Lead Local Flood Authorities (LLFA) within the South West Regional Flood and Coastal Committee (SWRFCC) area. These five Lead Local Flood Authorities are Cornwall Council, Devon County Council, Plymouth City Council, Torbay Council and the Council of the Isles of Scilly.

The SW PFR Pathfinder project aims to increase the awareness and uptake of Property Flood Resilience (PFR) in both residential and commercial properties across the South West. A key element of this project is to find innovative ways help individuals and communities that are at risk of flooding. It will also provide an opportunity for communities to work closely with local government and flood risk management experts.

The Pathfinder project is intended to:

- Lead on local innovations to improve take-up of property flood resilience techniques
- Raise awareness of flood risk and the impacts of climate change
- Simplify and streamline the process for PFR delivery
- Increase the flood resilience of communities in Devon, Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly, plus further afield through warning, forecasting and preparedness planning
- Provide materials and tools to demonstrate and promote the project to individuals and communities that would benefit from property level flood resilience and resistance.
- Establish a self-sustaining legacy, in the form of a professional hub for the future

We have included a questionnaire of your perceived flood risk which is a pull out and we are hoping that a large proportion of the community will get behind our case study, which will be for the whole Parish and not just the properties around the Trewedna stream. If you can drop the completed questionnaires to the village shop that would be brilliant.

Hospital wards of "iron lungs" were filled with people whose breathing muscles had been permanently paralysed by polio. Polio, tetanus, diphtheria, measles all killed thousands, many children. The flu epidemic in 1919 killed a million people.

All of these are epidemic infectious diseases largely eliminated by mass vaccination.

In 2019 we were a widely immunised population who never before had to face the risks of epidemic infectious diseases. Our children are immunised against these at a young age and we all have a better understanding of hygiene and infection prevention. We are all happy to get hepatitis, typhoid and cholera jabs to go on foreign holidays. Annual flu jabs are effective in preventing winter flu.

In 2020 we are facing a new infectious disease unlike anything in our lifetimes. It has killed over a million people world-wide. Covid-19 is a most unwelcome reminder of the danger granny had to live with for most of her life.

The last nine months has been a testing time for us all. Over 50,000 people have died in the UK, and many more have been left damaged after surviving the Corona virus.

Luckily for us, we live in modern times. A world-wide effort has produced vaccines which appear to offer an opportunity to confine C-19 to the history books, provided enough people are vaccinated.

Make sure you are one of them, to protect yourself, and your friends and family. The safety approval is imminent. The vaccine will then be offered, hopefully, very soon.


CORNISH PUBS WIN BII HEART OF THE COMMUNITY AWARD
